MISS YOUR CELL PHONE?

I read historian Benson Bobrick's fascinating *Wide as the Waters: The Story of the English Bible and the Revolution It Inspired*. It's the story of two English reformers—John Wycliffe, the brilliant Oxford scholar and Bible translator, remembered as “the Morning Star of the Reformation”; and martyr William Tyndale, whose English translation of Holy Scripture led to the King James Version and made the English Bible (next to the Bible itself) “the most influential book ever published.”

The profound impression Bobrick's history has left with me is the immensity of the debt we owe to these who sacrificed all so that we might possess our English Bibles today. So bright was the mind of Wycliffe that “even his later enemies

Slow Down, and Spend Some Time with God

It was years ago that I first read Bill Hybels' *Too Busy Not to Pray: Slowing Down to be with God*. This book had a huge impact on my understanding of the power of prayer for living a radical Christian life connected to God. I always had an interest in prayer and sought opportunities to pray with others whenever I could. But I sensed that I needed more prayer in order to know God's specific will over a decision I needed to make. I wanted to live a life for God that never held back on anything. But deep inside I was scared about making a transition that would affect the rest of my life. I had to be sure I was following God's will and so I prayed intensely by myself and with others, I listened, and I waited. I decided to take that road no matter where it led and in the process experienced the power of prayer in seeking His daily presence in my life. Hybels captured

the heart of prayer when he said, "It boils down to this: if you are willing to invite God to involve Himself in your daily challenges, you will experience His prevailing power – in your home, in your relationships, in the marketplace, in the school, in the church, wherever it is most needed." Don't we all need God's prevailing power right now living on the brink of eternity? What is the alternative? People who don't pray, Hybels explained, "Cut themselves off from God's prevailing power, and the frequent result is the familiar feeling of being overwhelmed, over-run, beaten down, pushed around, defeated. Surprising numbers of people are willing to settle for lives like that. Don't be one of them." I concur. Make prayer an important part of your life today and experience personal revival through prayer.

MASTER PLAN OF EVANGELISM

INDIANA \ NEW PERCEPTIONS EVANGELISTIC SERIES

Pastor Dwight Nelson will conduct an evangelistic series in South Bend, IN during the winter of 2011 as a follow up to PMC's New Perceptions telecast in the Michiana area.

New Perceptions is the telecast of PMC's 11:30 a.m. worship service on Sabbaths when Pastor Dwight preaches, and features young adults leading in worship as well as Pastor Dwight's Sabbath messages. It airs on Channel 46 at noon and midnight on Sundays. Over 200 viewers have requested the Discover Bible Course lessons, and hundreds more have responded to other special offers. Presently, Steps to Christ is being offered to local viewers who call and request it.

Previous follow up events have brought out 50-75 non-member viewers, but have merely been one-session events. The 2011 winter series will be ten sessions and will cover cardinal Adventist beliefs. This series will be advertised on the telecast, with special invitations being given to all Michiana viewers who have requested any previous offers we have made on the telecast.

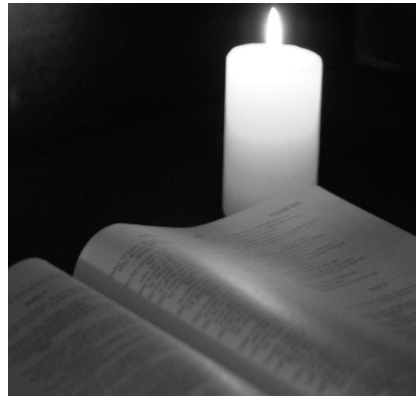

agreed (as one confessed) that he was 'second to none in philosophy, unrivalled in the Schools, and the flower of Oxford. Many divines esteemed him little less than a god.' He wrote many works in Latin as well as English . . . and his theological tomes were as knotty and learned as those by any scholiast. One weary Czech scribe, copying out a section, exclaimed in the margin, 'Dear God, help me to finish this work as quickly as I can'" (27). William Tyndale, from the protective cover of Holland, sent copies of his own English translation across the channel into England, and quietly the seeds of an eventual revolution—both spiritual and political—were sown. Not without price. On October 6, 1536, he was "brought forth to the place of execution, tied to a stake, strangled first by the hangman, then 'with fire consumed.' Before he lost consciousness, he cried 'with a fervent zeal and a loud voice: "Lord, open the King of England's eyes'" (135).

At what price we possess our English Bibles this Thanksgiving! And yet are we really that thankful? Some dear soul forwarded to me a forwarded-forwarded-forwarded email (you know the type) with the simple query—"Ever wonder what would happen if we treated our Bible like we treat our cell phone?" Now the FW'ed piece had my attention. "What if we carried it around in our purses or pockets? What if we flipped

through it several times a day? What if we turned back to go get it if we forgot it? What if we used it to receive messages from the text? What if we gave it to kids as gifts? What if we used it when we traveled? What if we used it in case of emergency?"

A century before cell phones Ellen White wrote: "The Bible is God's voice speaking to us, just as surely as if we could hear it with our ears. If we realized this, with what awe we



would open God's Word and with what earnestness we would search its precepts. The reading and contemplation of the Scriptures would be regarded as an audience with the Infinite One" (*My Life Today* 283).

Then this Thanksgiving—even as we sing in the language of the old King James, "Come, ye thankful people, come"—shall we not fervently thank God for the inestimable gift of His Book?





MUSIC ALIVE

FAR GOD, NEAR GOD

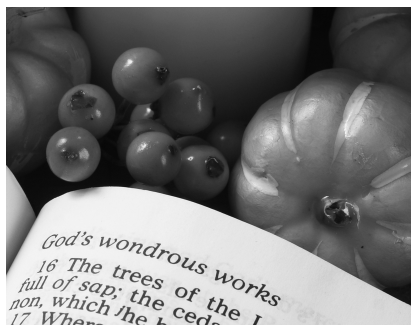
Rejoicing in God's transcendence, giving thanks for His immanence: these privileges are reflected in today's musical worship journey.

Shall we not rejoice in the transcendent God, in hymn no. 73, "Holy, Holy, Holy"? The text alludes to the splendid scene in Revelation 4:8-11. The university chorale sings of the "merciful and mighty" Almighty Lord, of bright crowns cast down "around the glassy sea", of the hidden glory of the One "perfect in power, in love and purity." The congregation's celebratory part is the final mighty stanza: "all Thy works shall praise Thy name..." The hymn's striding melody, NICAEA, is by Englishman John Dykes (1823-1876).



Already at age ten Dykes served as church organist in his grandfather's church. Ultimately he composed some three hundred hymn melodies.

And shall we not give thanks for the immanent God, in the hymn-based anthem "There's Not a Friend Like the Lowly Jesus"? Others from far and wide have with thanksgiv-



ing reflected on this hymn (found in varying numbers of stanzas). *Gilbert Orina Onsumu*, of Nairobi, Kenya, says, "This is a memorable song...It gave me strength during my military training when days were longer than usual." *Isabelle C.*, of North Charleston, South Carolina, observes, "...this song elevates me, strengthens me, guides me, and brings me nearer to Jesus..." *Chuks O.*, of Rivers State, Nigeria, testifies, "God ministered to me through this song when my brother was taken [hostage] by kidnappers....True to His Word and the Glory of His name, my brother has been miraculously released." The text is by American author Johnson Oatman (1856-1922). Like Dykes, Oatman early experienced music in church, for, as one commentary has it, "His father was an excellent singer, and it always delighted the son to sit by his side and hear him sing the songs of the church."

So are we, young and old, delighted today to hear—and to sing—the songs of the church?
