30,000 AMERICANS FASTING?

A friend of mine sent me a MoveOn. Judge my friend (or me) by that action! I realize it's a bit risky even mentioning this national left-of-center organization of political activists. But I'm also going to risk alienating a generation of young activists (which most of "this generation" is—whether left-of-center, right-of-center, middle-of-center, wherever that is) by commenting on the particular causeresponse for which this MoveOn.org email is recruiting.

The cause? The just-voted (by the midnight deadline) compromise budget agreement adopted by the House and Senate of the U.S. Congress. Incensed with some of the announced "immoral budget cuts," MoveOn solicited the popular recording artist, Moby

REVIVAL & REFORMATION

BE PART OF GOD'S MOSAIC

St. Mark's Cathedral in Venice Italy, has one of the most beautiful mosaics in the world. Made of thousands of tiny pieces of colored glass, stone and other materials, the completed presentation is genuinely awe-inspiring!

In preparing that mosaic, the artist carefully contemplated the desired outcome, developed an appropriate plan, and began selecting and placing the individual pieces into position. The work was tedious, difficult, and required constant attention to the tiniest details. For a long time the work was very incomplete, and undoubtedly seemed overwhelming. By themselves, none of the pieces were that significant, yet joined to other pieces, they eventually became the beautiful mosaic that still awes visitors in our day.

You and I have been selected to be part of God's mosaic here on earth. By ourselves we may seem unimportant, but joined to others, we become that thing of beauty—and power! that honors God and advances His Kingdom. It goes without saying that achieving the desired outcome requires EVERY piece to be in its right place.

Last week we noticed how Eliezer immediately got an answer to his prayer when seeking a bride for Isaac because he completely trusted God to immediately bring the right person to the well where he was praying. But a triumphant return depended on Rebekah—a piece in God's mosaic in her day—agreeing to return with him. Up to that time her life had been the typical common life of the young women of her day—tending things around the house, fetching water, making meals. The arrival of Eliezer changed everything.

Eliezer was single-minded in his quest: he had come for one reason; had prayed for a quick answer; expected a quick answer, and planned to return just as quickly. The family was willing, but at the last moment asked if Rebekah might not stay an extra ten days. Eliezer was unwilling, asked Rebekah directly if she would come, she agreed, and the rest is history.

We are making history in our day. Our Eliezer is not only knocking at the doors of our hearts in a general way, but He is also asking us to do our part, in making up the beautiful united mosaic that will prove to the world that Jesus came from heaven (John 17:21,23), and will bring the latter day fire of the Holy Spirit!

It says "they were all with one accord, in ONE place," on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1,2), praying, when the fire fell upon them. We are praying for a modern day Pentecost in our church, don't you think we ought to be in one accord, in one place, praying, seeking the same baptism of the Spirit like they were? Can a mosaic be complete without ALL the pieces? No! Each member should be joining in praying! Be part of God's mosaic this Wednesday evening at House of Prayer as we continue to pursue revival!

The program encourages Bible study, both as an individual and as part of a group. Valuable lessons in working as part of a team and

in-depth studying are learned. The program was developed in 1987 by Elder Terry Dodge, who, at the time, was a pastor of the Seventhday Adventist Church in Sheridan, Wyoming. The goal of the program was to encourage teams of Pathfinder to "search the scriptures daily."

This year the teams are studying First and Second Corinthians plus the SDA Bible Commentary's introduction for both of these books. PMC Evergreen Club's 2011 Bible Bowl members are Javiera Alquinta, Kara Kang, Kirk Kang, Jonathan Logan, Roxy Maxwell, Beza Munyumbwe and

Deborah Munyumbwe. They have been meeting three days a week for 90-120 minutes since November. Each team member has a portion of the book they are responsible Practice time involves lots of for. memory work, reading aloud, guizzes and jeopardy type games. Our team received first place at the February 5th (Area Level) and March 5th (State Level) meets. The Union Level meet was April 2 and today, April 16th, PMC hosts the Division Level Bible Bowl. (I had to go online to find out who he was), to record a YouTube piece decrying the government's abandonment of children, the young, the elderly in favor of corporations and the wealthy. (It's more of the hackneyed political debate that we've become accustomed to in this nation—both sides/parties zealously resorting to over-kill to drive home their agendas.)

But leaving that debate for others, consider for a moment MoveOn's protest strategy. They are recruiting 30,000 Americans to voluntarily undergo a food fast to show solidarity with the economically disenfranchised in this nation. Give up eating a meal or two, for a day or two, to show the nation's leaders how concerned you are over the plight of the poor, and the government's response (or lack, thereof). "30,000 people fasting" is the email's subject line.

Why talk about this at all? Because what struck me, as I watched the faces of ordinary Americans holding up empty plates with words of protest scribbled onto those plates, was the question: What if we—the young and old in the church—felt as deeply about the spiritual poverty and spiritual starvation of our nation, our world, our civilization? How willing would we be to fast from food—not to move Congress, but to plead with the God of the universe to give us his heart for the starving and then give us the courage to become missionaries for him to America, to the world, to every soul we know hungry for the Bread of Life?

How serious is the famine of spiritual starvation? **"Behold, the**

days are coming,' says the Lord GOD, 'that I will send a famine on the land, not a famine of bread, nor a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the LORD. They shall wander from sea to sea, and from north to east; they shall run to and fro, seeking the word of the LORD, but shall not find it''' (Amos 8:11, 12). The prophet declares that one day there will be no Bread of Life left for the starving civilization as we know it will implode upon itself.

But that day is not here yet. There still is time to take Christ, the only satisfying Bread of Life (John 6:35), to this starving generation. We must never fast from that Bread. But perhaps we, too, might do well to fast from our daily bread and prav, in order to seek the mind of God for the part he would have us play in his endtime "spiritual famine relief." Once vou have the Bread for vourself, there's no telling where the Spirit will send you in order for you to share it. Move on, indeed! Because there is a hunger no government on earth will ever be able to satisfy. And because if we don't, people will starve to death. So what will be your next move?

But you, brothers and sisters, are not in darkness so that this day should surprise you like a thief.

MUSIC ALIVE

O WHEN?

"O, When Shall I See Jesus?" is a question echoed through the centuries. As a hymn (no. 448), it has roots in diverse regions of the United States. Its author, John Leland, was an itinerant Baptist New Englander preacher who preached in Virginia. As a strong champion of religious liberty, Leland had an impact on the introduction of America's First Amendment to the Constitution. B. F. White of Georgia contributed part of the hymn, attributed to 1847, a date that marks an essential era in the lives of early Advent-believing Christians. The hymn includes several phrases that are similar to words from African-American spirituals, such as "You may bury me in the east, you may bury me in the west; But I'll hear the trumpet sound in that morning."

HOW CROP WALK FUNDS ARE USED LOCALLY

Twenty-five percent of the money raised in our Blossomland CROP Walk is designated to help fight hunger in our area. Each of the six charitable organizations which we help also serve the community in a variety of ways with funds from other organizations, but CROP Walk funds must be used for hunger needs.

BENTON HARBOR SOUP KITCHEN

The Soup Kitchen serves on an average of 200 meals per day and received \$2,289.16 from the CROP Walk funds.

FAIRPLAIN FOOD PANTRY

The Fairplain Food Pantry distributes about 2,321 food bags to 2,554 persons. They received \$2,289.16 last year from the CROP Walk funds.

CATHOLIC COMMUNITY CENTER

The Catholic Community Center supplied food bags to 500 households each year. They received \$2,289.16 from the CROP Walk funds.

SALVATION ARMY

The Salvation Army served 3,472 families and received \$2,289.16 last year from the CROP Walk funds.



BENTON HARBOR STREET MINISTRY

The Benton Harbor Street Ministry supplied over 155 families and 388 Individuals from its Food Pantry, served 3,852 after-school meals and distributed 40 Thanksgiving baskets. They received \$2,289.16 from the CROP Walk funds last year.

BERRIEN SPRINGS BREAD FROM HEAVEN

They distributed 38,368 pounds of food last year and helped 10,800 persons. They received \$2,289.16 from the CROP Walk funds last year.

These distributions amounted to \$13,722.47 (25%) of the total amount of \$54,889.88 raised by the CROP Walk in 2010.
