

The next time you're in Charlotte, North Carolina, you <u>must</u> visit the new Billy Graham Library. After preaching at the Carolina camp meeting this past weekend, Karen and I, with our friends David and Marilyn Bauer, toured that high-tech exhibit and tribute to the life and ministry of this man with a household name, who has preached to more people than any other preacher in history. What an inspiring testimony!

Because it is the story of a farm boy who grew up to become the fiery gospel evangelist the world has come to respect, and even revere, the library is in the form of a fourstorey red barn with a towering glass entrance in the shape of the cross. Entering Billy Graham's life story through the cross, you are led by a team of volunteers through a maze of electronically guided exhibits. (In

REVIVAL & REFORMATION

AN UNWELCOMED MESSAGE AND MESSENGER

There shall not be dew nor rain these years, except at my word."

1 Kings 17:1

I am sure it wasn't easy for Elijah to tell Ahab that it wasn't going to rain for three and a half years. Undoubtedly the people of Israel were enjoying material and other prosperity. Elijah was also enjoying that prosperity. As a man of normal human feelings he undoubtedly shrank back from delivering such a message.

I am sure it wasn't easy for God to send Elijah back with the unwelcomed message either. After all, these were His people and He loved them. He had raised them up as a special people through Abraham, rescued them from Egyptian bondage through Moses, opened up the land through Joshua, and blessed through countless heroes since. They had enjoyed the sunshine of his favor in a preeminent way. The nations around them had been looking on with wonder. There seemed to be no blessing they had not enjoyed. Yet they had forgotten the God of their fathers and had begun serving other Gods.

In the time of Moses God had promised blessings or cursings, depending on their obedience or lack of obedience to Him. Forgetting God, ignoring His communication, the people had set their stubborn hearts against Him, taken His blessings for granted, used their prosperity in ungodly ways, spurned many appeals for reformation and were greatly dishonor-

ing God. So God had no choice but to send a warning of coming disaster through Elijah.

It goes without saying the message was hated. Not only that, the messenger bearing the message was also hated. We have been given a special message for our time, and it was delivered by a special messenger. Is either very welcomed in our day? Have things changed much since Elijah's time?

God wants to bless our congregation with the sunshine of his favor and bring a revival of true godliness. He has clearly communicated on the subject through His messengers. Are we reading His communication? Are we taking it to heart? Not only must we pray, but we must study to know where adjustments are needed to experience the hoped for revival. Then we need to unreservedly surrender ourselves to whatever God wants!

or several years, Phil Giddings, Jr. High Language Arts teacher, has encouraged his students to enter the Creative Communication essay contest. Creative Communications is a company devoted to the promotion of writing, teaching and appreciation of student writing. Entries are judged by a group of published writers and educators and top entries are published in an anthology. With less than 50% of the essays submitted chosen for publication, being among that group is an honor. This year's topic chosen for students to write about was "Celebrating What is Important to Me."

Recently Giddings was notified that over 50% of his students' essays were accepted for publication. This puts Ruth Murdoch Elementary School in the top 10% among schools nationwide that entered the contest. RMES will be recognized in the anthology as receiving a "Writing Achievement Award."

Essay topics ranged from "Facebook vs. MySpace" to "Vegetarianism" to "Atheism vs. Adventism" to "Laughter". The wide range in topics shows that RMES students are thinking about the world they live in and the world they are preparing for. They are contemplating spiritual truths and sharpening the gifts God has given them.

Giddings' students have received this honor for several years. We appreciate his gift and passion for teaching and the way he encourages his students to be all that God intends them to be.

an obvious appeal to youngsters the tour actually begins inside a dairy barn milking stall with "Bessie"—a lifelike mechanically talking cow—introducing you to Billy's boyhood.)

As we spent the afternoon moving from scene to scene, theme to theme, what impressed me over and over was the dogged focus on Christ and God's offer of salvation that Billy Graham maintained throughout his public ministry. Notwithstanding the overflowing stadiums where millions nationally and globally came to hear his preaching, or the popping flash bulbs and whirling cameras as he stood beside presidents and royalty and government leaders, or the news media's curious fascination with his strict morality and unabashed faith in stark contrast with other public figures—Billy Graham blended a genuine humility with an unvielding confidence in the message God had called him to deliver to his generation.

But then, aren't you and I called to that same humble confidence in Jesus'"present truth" for our generation? As it was for Billy Graham, shouldn't it be for us? Just a few weeks before the Los Angeles crusade that would catapult him into national prominence, he came to a crisis point in his young ministry. A ministerial classmate and friend had challenged Billy's faith in the "old time religion" of Scripture. Graham struggled with that challenge—could it be the Bible was not the reliable Book he had come to trust? One night at a retreat in the San Bernardino Mountains, he fell to his knees. "O God! There are many things in this book I do not understand." In his autobiography he described that struggle. "I was trying to be on the level with God, but something remained unspoken. At last the Holy Spirit freed me to say it. 'Father, I am going to accept this as Thy Word—by faith! I'm going to allow faith to go beyond my intellectual questions and doubts, and I will believe this to be Your inspired Word"" (Just as I Am 139). His decision was made. And the rest is history.

A kingdom history you and I, too, can help write for Christ, can't we? In the hours since visiting the Library, I have pondered our own mission in this third millennium. In the back of my Bible I carry these words: "In a special sense Seventh-day Adventists have been set in the world as watchmen and light bearers. To them has been entrusted the last warning for a perishing world. On them is shining wonderful light from the word of God. They have been given a work of the most solemn import—the proclamation of the first, second, and third angels' messages. There is no other work of so great importance." But it's the last line that compels my attention. "They are to allow nothing else to absorb their attention" (9T 19).

On this day in which we welcome our new Pastor for "This Generation" Evangelism, I wish you would join me in committing ourselves to this highest mission of all on behalf of our soon-coming Savior. Why even a farm boy can impact the world for Christ!

VISION AND FANTASY

A vision from Almighty God to a human being is as real as any physical object. Though untouchable, the vision is experienced. Though extraordinary, the vision touches the ordinary. And one would suppose that such a vision would seem, to the recipient, as a most unusual experience. Fantasy, on the other hand, may be thought to be that which is not real, not necessarily based

in fact and reason, only imagined. Yet fantasy, curiously, may invoke a sense of the reality of vision. It is in this sense that today's concluding music, a towering "fantasie", seems a fitting climax to a service with words from the book of Daniel as focal point. This fantasie's soaring lines, huge chords, and striding bass seem to evoke imagery similar to the astounding imagery in Daniel 10.






