HOLY HUMBLE WORK

11 Then He said, "Do not draw near this place. Take your sandals off your feet, for the place where you stand is holy ground." Ex. 3:5

"But I am sure that the king of Egypt will not let you go, no, not even by a mighty hand." Ex. 3:19

"It is our work, by confession, humiliation, repentance, and earnest prayer, to fulfill the conditions upon which God has promised to grant us His blessing." Selected Messages, Vol. 1, p. 121

As God was speaking to Moses through the burning bush, the former proud, confident, potential heir to the Egyptian throne was standing in his



bare feet. The reason: the ground where he was standing was "holy" ground.

What made the ground "holy"? What makes anything "holy"? Had the ground been magically transformed into something different? Would visitors to the area forever sense a certain enduring "holy" quality? Would the bush continue burning as an eternal reminder of the sublime interchange? No! God's presence made the ground holy; God's presence made the bush to burn.

To enter and linger in that presence, Moses had to remove his sandals and stand before God in humble vulnerability. He had to humble himself—die to self—to be in God's presence!

Revival is all about the presence of God in His people. To experience His presence, a humbling must take place—we must die to self! It isn't easy work, but it is necessary. And just as Pharaoh would bitterly contest losing control over the Israelites in his country, so our adversary will bitterly contest losing control over our lives!

For Moses the freedom movement entered a new phase when he humbly removed his shoes to be in God's presence. I wonder what God would tell one of our professors to remove? I wonder what He would ask of a student? I wonder what he would say to one of our moms or dads? What would he ask of a teenager? In what way is God asking you to remove your shoes?

"Have we humbled ourselves before God, that the Holy Spirit may work through us with transforming power? As children of God, it is our privilege to be worked by his Spirit. When self is crucified, the Holy Spirit takes the broken hearted ones, and makes them vessels unto honor. They are in his hands as clay in the hands of the potter. Jesus Christ will make such men and women superior in mental, physical, and moral power." Southern Work, December 5, 1899

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION / THE AA ADVANTAGE

t's all too easy for the value of Adventist education to dim when we see the monthly bill arrive in the mail. But when we were asked to present a short tribute on behalf of Michael, our graduating Andrews Academy senior, we started thinking a bit more carefully about the *valueadded* opportunities that Andrews Academy brought to Michael's life. Such discussions usually focus on the strong academics and spiritual benefits of Adventist education.

First, Andrews Academy creates a powerful sense of community. Student clubs, community outreach activities, class functions, sports teams, national and international educational and band tours, and vespers programs provide so many opportunities for students to build friendships and form lifetime bonds. These activities provide an ongoing sense of belonging - a connection to friends, the families of their friends, and even the larger Adventist church community. The research literature is clear that positive friendships, family, and church networks predict future success and also help to keep kids from becoming involved in a wide variety of risky activities.

Second, Andrews Academv provides numerous opportunities for leadership and service. Although the fears surrounding public speaking and leadership are powerful, the Academy pushes students to lead out in so many areas, thereby helping students to overcome this fear. While public schools often have optional activities for students, the size and focus of most public schools makes leadership and service opportunities less likelv. However, at Andrews Academy, students are constantly provided with opportunities to lead and serve.

Finally, Andrews Academy provides amazing diversity of both students and faculty. Michael has friends from Korea, Malawi, Kenya, China, Romania, France, Samoa, Chile, and a dozen or two other countries.

THE FOURTH WATCH

Welcome to the Fourth Watch—a new blog in print and online (<u>www.</u> <u>pmchurch.tv</u>)—a running, weekly commentary on the times that are fast becoming the fourth watch of history.

For centuries the ancient Jews divided their nights into three watches. But with the ascendency of Rome, by New Testament times Jews had adopted the Roman four-watch night: first watch (6 - 9 p.m., called "evening"); second watch (9 p.m. - midnight, called "midnight"); third watch (midnight - 3 a.m., called "cock-crowing"); and fourth watch (3 a.m. - 6 a.m., called "morning"—see Mark 13:35 for all four). The fourth watch was the last watch before the break of day, the darkest hour of the night before the dawn.

And not surprisingly it was the watch Jesus mastered. **"Now in the fourth** watch of the night Jesus went to them, walking on the sea" (Matthew 14:25). But are you surprised? Wouldn't the blackest hour of the night belong

to the God "who knows what is in the darkness, and light dwells with Him" (Daniel 2:22)?

So how dark is the night you're traversing these days? Darker than your physician understands? Darker than your closest friends will ever know? As stormy and dark and uncertain as this

civilization's economic fourth watch? No matter how dark life has become, one terse line from the Gospel story declares that in the blackest watch of all, Christ walks the dark and the storm. No shadows, no storm, no night so dark but that he hurries to you, too. You do not walk alone. "In the darkest hour [the fourth watch], Jesus will be our light.... In every condition of trial, we may have the consolation of his presence" (RH 4-15-1884).

Which makes William Whiting's prayer the right prayer for a university on the eve of a new year and a civilization in the fourth watch of the night, doesn't it?

O Christ, whose voice the waters heard And hushed their raging at Thy word Who walkedst on the foaming deep And calm amidst the rage didst sleep Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee...

A prayer for the Fourth Watch. Amen.

So whenever we're tempted to wonder if our kids are getting the extra value that should come with that daunting monthly price tag, we remember that the ever-present spiritual influence, the powerful sense of community, the many opportunities for leadership and service, and the wide diversity of both students and teachers makes Andrews Academy a school that is worth the cost.

As musicians both lead and give way to each other, they illustrate aspects of community, wrapped in celebration especially for these Sabbath services.

AUG. 15-20 / THIS YEAR'S TENT IS EXERCISE-FOCUSED.

There will be training on the following days:

Sabbath, August 13, 3-5 PM in the PMC Youth Chapel: Welcome stations, host/hostesses, blood-pressure station, prayer tree station, PMC health ministry booth, D9 church booth, data entry, registration tables, set-up, take-down, and the water station.

Sunday, August 14, 1-3 PM in the PMC Commons: Exercise demonstrations, exercise challenges, exercise plans, massage therapists, kids' station, and Andrews University athletic/sports entities.



Blood-pressure Readings (BP) - You must be familiar with this process.

Welcome (outside) (WO) - Must be friendly and welcoming to the general public. Greet people at the door, and invite them to participate in our activities. Be able to answer questions related to the activities in the tent.

Welcome (inside) (WI) - Direct people in the tent, and be able to answer questions about each station.

Massage (sign-in) (MS) - Register people for 10-minute massages and announce names for appointments.

Registration/waiver (R) - For each exercise station/challenge, the participant fills out a registration form and a waiver before participating in an exercise station or challenge.

Data entry (DE) - During the entire week, we will need people to input participants' information into the computer. You must be able to type and decipher hand-written registration forms.

Set-up (SU) - Sunday, August 14, 8:30 AM - 12 PM help transport, assemble, and position all equipment used in the tent.

Take-down (TD) - Sunday, August 22, 8:30 AM - 12 PM.

Host/hostesses - Guide people in the tent, help direct them, and answer questions they may have.

Massage Therapists/Physical Therapists (MT) - Provide a 10-minute basic upper back/neck massage, describing the benefits of massage to participants.

Prayer Tree Team (PTT) - Take prayer requests, put them on a tree, pray with participants if they want you to.

Exercise demonstrations (ED) - Be able to properly demonstrate exercises and explain the benefits of the following: core exercise (push-ups, sit-ups, plank, etc.,) Bosu Ball, stability/resistance ball, arm-strengthening exercises using dumbbells, Therabands, step-up, and the elliptical machine.

Exercise plans (EP) - Be able to determine which exercise plans participants need.

Kids' station (KS) - Kids' fitness exercise demonstration, including jumping jacks, basic eye-hand coordination with throwing, catching, kicking a ball, and other exercises.

Pioneer Memorial Church Health Ministry Booth (PMC) - Hand out brochure for 2011/2012 year, and be able to explain/answer questions related to our health events.






