'FRAID OF HEIGHTS?

If you're afraid of heights, don't read any further. But can you imagine people actually doing this for a living? The engineering firm—Wiss (that's not "woos"), Janev, Elostner Associates Inc., from Northbook, Illinois—has been hired by the National Park Service to provide an inch-by-inch inspection of the Washington Monument in our nation's capital. How much damage did this national treasure sustain in the recent earthquake that shook Virginia and the east coast? To find out on Tuesday, two of the firm's "difficult access team" members under the watchful eye of Brandon Latham, a ranger from Denali (Mt McKinley) National Park in Alaska, himself an expert at rappelling crawled out a hatch (unopened for the past 11 years) and climbed within feet of the 555-foot-high pyramid tip of the monument to begin setting

PROPHECIES DECODED / BE A PART OF THE TEAM




NEIGHBOR TO NEIGHBOR / BEDDING PROGRAM

imited by the restrictions of travel, many international students arrive at Andrews University minus bulky bedding items that would serve to keep them warm during our bitterly cold Berrien Springs winters. Consequently, Neighbor To Neighbor partners with the Michigan Conference through our International Student Bedding Program to provide some of these much needed items.

Last year we served 50 families distributing 84 sets of dishes and bedding. This year the number has

increased significantly and due to high costs we were unable to add the dish sets we did previously. However blankets, sheets, towels, wash cloths and pillows were given out to 68 families representing 118 persons.

Many students have voiced their gratitude and remarked that this has truly been a life-saving gesture. We are pleased that God can use us to bless others and we pray that He will continue to bless this program and provide adequate funding.

A t Andrews Academy we feel that it is important for students to learn to serve in their community. We teach this concept in a very practical way by devoting an entire day to community service projects and also doing various smaller projects throughout the year. Our Community Service Day this year took place on September 22.

Students and staff helped a retired couple in town by cleaning their windows, cutting up firewood for the winter and other odd jobs. They cleaned the grounds at

Warren Dunes, the Berrien Springs Courthouse Museum as well as the Berrien County Youth fairgrounds and the area by the town bridge.

They also picked up trash in the woods behind Maplewood and Garland apartments; a project they have done for the past sixteen years. This might seem like a trivial task, however, it has made a noticeable

difference in the community. "When we began picking up litter in this area, it took us lots of time and effort. We picked up couches, beds, bikes, etc. from the woods. By maintaining the woods each year people are now less prone to throw trash there. Some might consider picking up garbage an unpleasant task, but as stewards of



God's earth, it becomes an honor to do this." says teacher Steven Atkins.

"We pray our bit of effort went a long way to demonstrate the philosophy of Andrews Academy and the diligence, maturity and selflessness of its students. God gave us a beautiful day and we were blessed to work in the community."





Having iust returned from Paris where the euro still reigns, I was surprised that Bloomberg's business editors this week challenged the brave face that Germany and France are putting regarding Greece's financial meltdown: "They're all in denial. Almost no one believes Greece is solvent, not with an economy-and tax receipts—shrinking and debt ballooning to 180 percent of gross domestic product, a burden that no amount of belt-tightening will make bearable. The question now is whether Europe can arrange a controlled and orderly default, or will allow a Greek bankruptcy that is chaotic and destructive to the global economy." THE POWER

The author of "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name", Englishman Edward Perronet, was of Swiss Huguenot lineage. He worked ardently for Methodism to the point of suffering physical abuse occasioned by his preaching. Preacher John Wesley wrote that Perronet "was thrown down and rolled in mud and mire". In the American Revolution's shadow appeared the first stanza of the hymn. The Seventh-day Adventist Hymnal

no. 229 uses four of its seven stanzas, Those four stanzas were headed with titles in this order: Angels, Sinners of Every Age, Sinners of Every Nation, Ourselves. So this hymn starts with angels and sweeps over time and the face of the earth, finally bringing the message home concerning "ourselves." What will we do with the message of this royal Lord?
