

arth Day is this Monday, April 22. Want a practical way to make an ecological difference on this planet? Let me borrow a page from my 2012 devotional book *The Chosen* (April 26 reading) and share it here in the Fourth Watch blog:

Paul Hawkens in his "green" book, Blessed Unrest, tells of an old rabbinical teaching that if we hear that the world is ending and the Messiah is coming, we must first plant a tree and then go and determine if the story is true or not. For Seventh-day Adventists, who champion God's creation memorial and who celebrate the return of the Creator, planting a tree isn't such a bad idea, is it?

For millennia now our creation has suffered deeply under the effects of our very human rebellion. "For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God. . . . We know that the whole creation

FROM BABYLON: TO ALL KINDRED, NATIONS, TONGUES, AND PEOPLES

n this message from the king of Babylon, can be heard echoes of Paul in his epistles—"grace and peace to you". Over many years, God gradually changed Nebuchadnezzar's heart from one of pride to that of humble loving submission. God's rescue of Nebuchadnezzar is a 'first fruits' promise of those who will come out of Babylon in response to the messages of four angels given at the end of time.

"To all peoples, nations, and languages that dwell in all the earth: Peace be multiplied to you.

I thought it good to declare the signs and wonders that the Most High God has worked for me. ...God is the God of gods, and the Lord of kings, and a revealer of secrets... Praise be to the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, who has sent his angel and rescued his servants! They trusted in him and defied the king's command and were willing to give up their lives rather than serve or worship any god except their own God, ... for no other god can save in this way. How great are His signs, and how mighty His wonders! His kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and His dominion is from generation to generation.

...And at the end of the time I, Nebuchadnezzar, lifted my eyes to heaven, and my understanding returned to me; and I blessed the Most High and praised and honored Him who lives forever: For His dominion is an everlasting dominion, and His kingdom is from generation to generation.

The theme for this spring's Week of Spiritual Emphasis in April was "The Seven Last Words of Christ." Students Jessica Smith, David Church, Joy Ngugi, Yuna Seo and Dillon Zimmerman presented worship thoughts focusing on Jesus' final messages to us. On Friday students carried three crosses to the Howard Performing Arts Center in preparation for the conclusion of the special week – a music performance by the AA Chorale and Orchestra.

In her presentation, Yuna Seo gave a testimony describing what the words of John 19:30 "It is finished" meant to her. "I didn't grow up Adventist, "Yuna explained. "I didn't even have a Bible

when I was young. But I went to an Adventist elementary school in Korea. And it's amazing how God drew me closer to Him. has been groaning in labor pains until now" (Romans 8:19, 22). Can you imagine the latent longing within the natural world for the promised deliverance? But until then, how shall we live, we Sabbath-keepers of the Creator's flame?

We could begin by eating green that's right, vegetarianism would diminish the number of animals raised and killed for consumption, and thus reduce the one-fifth of earth's greenhouse gases livestock produce! We can turn off the lights in the rooms we exit. We could inflate our tires and save 2 billion gallons of gas a year, some say. We could shorten our showers by two minutes, saving twelve gallons of water. We could recycle. We could save a few trees by skipping the receipts at ATMs and gas pumps, saving by one estimate 3 billion feet of paper. We could use our own thermos bottles and quit drinking bottled water, since a one liter bottle requires 5 liters of water to cool the

plastic, thus resulting in six liters of water for each bottle! Lists of "green" or environmentally friendly ways to live (like these from Ashleigh Burtnett that appeared in the *Student Movement* here at the university) are all over the web, and you can make your own.

The point? As Creator-worshiping, Sabbath-keeping, nature-preserving friends of Jesus. shouldn't be at the forefront of ecological conservation and environmental care and protection? Truth be known, God himself planted a tree once upon a time to save this creation. "To the death of Christ we owe even this earthly life. The bread [our farmland] we eat is the purchase of His broken body. The water [our rivers, streams] we drink is bought by His spilled blood. . . . The cross of Calvary is stamped on every loaf. It is reflected in every water spring" (DA 660). Given the infinite cost of planting that tree, we must join him in saving his creation. Don't you agree?



SPIRITUAL PARENTING

KIDS AND WORLDVIEW



Worldview? Isn't that for adults? Probably for theologians. I'm not sure what it means, so I'm sure it isn't for kids.

But it is for kids. Worldview

begins in childhood. Everyone has a worldview, even though many people don't know what it is or couldn't describe their worldview if you asked.

So, what is worldview? The Mirriam-Webster online dictionary says worldview is "the way someone thinks about the world." It's the mental lenses through which we see and interpret the world. Worldview is what guides our decisions. It's the basis for our decisions. It's the way we interpret what happens to us and what we see on the evening news.

A Biblical worldview is essential for successfully navigating our way through the many ideas and events we hear, see and experience every day. We want to look at the world through God's eyes. We want to interpret what happens to us with God's view.

One of the most important things we can do for our children's spiritual development is to help them develop a worldview based on God's Word. We have the great privilege of introducing our children to how God thinks.

Spring is a perfect time of year to focus on God the Creator, an essential component of a Biblical worldview. Even very young children can

understand something about God the Creator. God's Word is rich with references to the Creator God.

So, let's begin. Here are some ideas for introducing your children to God the Creator of the universe. Pick and choose what fits your family. Most importantly, enjoy!

- First, let's pick some key Bible statements about God the Creator: Genesis 1:1, 27, 28; 2:1,2; Exodus 20:11; Psalm 19:1; Rev 14:7. There are many more, but this is enough for kids. One verse is enough for preschool kids. Find and read only one or two verses at a time. Explain the meaning. Encourage the kids to tell you what the verse means and to mark it in their Bibles.
- A walk in the woods is a wonderful way to learn about God the Creator. In the Spring you will find many beautiful flowering trees and wild flowers. Take pictures of the trees and flowers. Find their names. For preschoolers, identify the color of each flower. God made the flowers in many pretty colors.
- On a visit to a farm or a zoo enjoy the many animals God created. Take a picture or draw a picture of each animal you see. When did God create the animals?
- Take a family Faith Walk around the Andrews campus and to the dairy. You will find many things God created. Talk about each thing you find. Collect leaves that fell during a wind storm. Find small rocks and sticks. Save them for making pictures on a rainy day.

- On a rainy Sabbath draw pictures of the days of creation. Dramatize each day of creation with sound effects and actions. Make a collage using things God made - small rocks, sticks, leaves, dried beans. Learn a song about creation. Plant a seed in some soil in a plastic cup or grow an avocado seed in water. The seeds grow because of God's continuing creative power. During every activity, talk about God the Creator who made Adam and Eve and all the things in the world. God made us. God keeps His creation going. He is always involved with His creation. Reflect on the kids' questions as they come up.
- Visit the Trillium Ravine Preserve.
 The Trilliums should be in their full glory this weekend. Go online to Harbor Country's Park Guide for directions and for descriptions of other nature preserves in Berrien County. God produces a wonderful display of His creative power during Spring time in Berrien County!

- Read the creation story from the Bible. Then read it from *The Bible Story* by Maxwell (vol 1) or *Forever Stories* by Byers (vol 1).
- Chapter 6 in each of the following books is about Creation: What We Believe For Kids by Thomas; What We Believe For Teens by Pierce; God Loves Me 28 Ways by Mills and Koh and its accompanying activity book Learn About God's Love. All are available at the ABC or online. These are great books for kids and teens.

Enjoy this first venture with your children as you explore one aspect of a Biblical worldview. From time to time we'll look at ideas for introducing our children to other parts of a Biblical worldview.

Wold's sprightly setting seems to suggest a walking that indeed is joyous.

HOW MUCH FOR GOD?

THIS POOR WIDOW HATH CAST IN MORE. LUKE 21:3

Many years ago, at a missionary meeting in Paris, a poor blind woman put 27 francs into the offering plate.

The deacon who had handed her the plate leaned over and whispered to her, "You cannot afford so much." "Yes, I can," she answered. Not satisfied with her answer, the deacon pressed her to tell him how she could give so much.

The woman replied, "I am blind. I asked some of my friends, 'How much money do you spend each year for the oil in your lamps in the evenings?' They estimated the cost and said that they spent 27 francs each year. So," said the blind woman, "I found that I save 27 francs each year because I'm blind and don't need a lamp, and I decided to give that much to send [share] the light of the gospel..."

How much would we give to God if we calculated what we pay each year for things we can get along without?

While in the temple court observing worshipers deposit offerings into the treasure chests, Jesus explained to the disciples that the poor widow who gave only two mites, her all, had actually given more than those of wealth who gave only a portion of their abundance.

The widow "longed to do something, little though it might be, for the cause she loved. She looked at the gift in her hand. It was very small in comparison with the gifts of those around her, yet it was her all. Watching her opportunity,

she hurriedly threw in her two mites, and turned to hasten away. But in doing this she caught the eye of Jesus. Then His words of commendation fell upon her ear: 'Of a truth I say unto you, that this poor widow hath cast in more than they all.' Tears of joy filled her eyes as she felt that her act was understood and appreciated. Her act was to be a monument to her memory through all time, and her joy in eternity.

It is the motive that gives character to our acts. Not the great things which every eye sees and every tongue praises does God count most precious. The little duties cheerfully done, the little gifts which make no show, and which to human eyes may appear worthless, often stand highest in his sight. A heart of faith and love is dearer to God than the most costly gift. It was this unselfish spirit and childlike faith that won the Savior's commendation." (*The Desire of Ages*)


Through time the example and influence of the widow's gift has been multiplied many times over until it can be truly said that "she hath cast in more than they all."

Today we have that same opportunity to cast in our "all". How? By first giving Him our "all" with a daily surrendering of ourselves to His call and purpose. 




