LINCOLN AND THE KOREANS

A few nights ago, Karen and I stood on the portico of the Lincoln Memorial in the nation's capital. It was this Lincoln who once observed, "It is good policy to never *plead* what you *need* not, lest you oblige yourself to *prove* what you *can* not."

The adage may be true for politics, but not for evangelism—that divine calling that compels the community of faith to both plead what it must and prove what it can on behalf of Christ's evangel. Which is why on the next night the Korean Adventist community gathered across this continent as the KNET 2012 satellite series, "A Future and a Friendship You Can Count On," was beamed from outside the nation's capital to North America. Two and half million Koreans live in the United States and Canada—15,000 of them Seventhday Adventists, who are passionate about reaching their compatriots far

I found myself watching my older brother and sister playing on a floating dock. They looked like they were having so much fun. A stranger came along and pulled me out, delivering me back to my friends, family, and mother.

This is our condition. We ignore the warnings of our Father and we fall into sin. We have no chance of getting out. Even if we knew how to get out, our clothing makes it impossible.

We are only saved because a stranger came along and pulled us out with strong arms. That stranger is Jesus.

Our story is the same as the Israelites, trapped in the land of Egypt as slaves to sin.

Let us weep and beg for the Lord to save us from our own foolishness.

OPERATING FUND

NEIGHBOR TO NEIGHBOR / BAGS OF LOVE

We are all aware of the drug problems that have ravaged our country. The sale and use of illegal drugs destroy lives, homes, relationships, and dreams. Often innocent children suffer because of the wrong choices their parents have made. When police charge through a house to make a drug bust, frightened children watch their caregiver being arrested and taken away. They are usually removed from the situation by Child Protective Services and leave behind all of their possessions. It's a heartbreaking scene that is repeated more than we can imagine.

"Bags of Love," a program at Neighbor to Neighbor, was created to give comfort to children in this kind of situation. Bags of Love are homemade duffle bags that contain a blanket, pillow, bath towel and washcloth, personal care items, and a stuffed toy or activity appropriate to the age and gender of the child. The items are collected at N2N and assembled by a team of volunteers. Lynn Steen, one of the volunteers, reports that an order

for 75 bags was recently filled. Some of the agencies we work with to get these bags to children are the Hope Rescue Mission, Berrien RESA, Safe Shelter Services, Benton Harbor Emergency Shelter, and Hope Ministries.

You can be a part of bringing comfort to a child by donating items for the bags, contributing to Neighbor to Neighbor (line 10 on the tithe and offering envelope) or becoming a Bags of Love volunteer. "Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me" (Matthew 25:40 NKJV).

PANAMA TRIP / LIVES CHANGED FOR THE KINGDOM

J.N. Andrews would be very proud and I am sure his Facebook posts would have sounded a lot like those from the Panama Youth Evangelism team this summer. Look at a couple of the lines that were copied and pasted from Facebook:

- Iwent to Panama to change people's lives, but the person who ended up being changed the most is me.
- Today has made me realize how this Mission Trip has already changed me....My relationship with God has grown SO much greater, and I've witnessed countless miracles.
- I've never felt the Holy Spirit move so much in my life and in the life of the people in my church. PANAMA PARA CRISTO.

Our team of 17 spent those 20 days in the country of Panama. Each of these young people preached 19 sermons in 16 days. God did what He promised, and the final Sabbath we were preaching, there were 136 baptisms.

We are Seventh-day Adventists and we have been given a message to preach to the world, even other Christians. Our young people took



the call this summer and preached.

As William Little, one of our team leaders, points out, "The theme of mission is lives changed...for the kingdom." And as a pastor, I have not seen anything that does as much for young people as an opportunity like this.

This next year (2013) we are working and praying toward organizing two evangelistic trips. And the young people are already asking how they can sign up and what they can do in our local area to be evangelistic.



from their homeland. Thus it was my privilege to stand beside Pastor Don Kim and preach nightly—in English and Korean—to the fifty to sixty downlink sites across the continent.



The truth is we were flying on the updraft of ten thousand prayers! The Korean Christian community is known the world over for its deep commitment to collective praying. Korean houses of worship on any continent open early in the morning and close late at night for prayer meetings. As we were preparing to leave our hotel this Sunday for the drive home, a Korean family stopped by to say good-bye. I apologized to them for having to awaken early to meet us before we left. Iris, a young board certified pediatrician at nearby Johns Hopkins, said not to worry, "We were at prayer meeting this morning at 6." On a Sunday morning? At 6? Korean Adventists believe in the power of collective prayer!

And it was clear to me that God honored both their intercessions and their evangelism. Anchorage, Toronto, Los Angeles, Atlanta, Boston, New York City, Chicago, and yes, Berrien Springs—as the nightly reports came in from the multiple sites, our team of pastors and church members at the host site in the Baltimore First church reioiced. This is the first time the Korean Adventist community has undertaken a project like this in North America. (Previous events were uplinked from Seoul and relaved to America.) And so you can sense the enthusiasm in the air at our site with the large white HOPE-TV satellite truck outside-LA reported 40 quests in attendance and Napa called in with news that nine individuals will be baptized this Sabbath (two reports in English I could understand), and our own attendance in Baltimore grew nightly until Sabbath morning's full house of worship. The Korean women's choir. Bistori ("The Sound of Light")—replete with colorful garb and heavenly music, flew in from LA Friday for the final two sessions. It was a God-blessed event because you prayed.

And so I end this brief report with a personal word of thanksgiving to my home congregation. Your own passion to share the everlasting gospel and your commitment to partner in prayer are two very special gifts for which I continually thank God. And I dream of the day when team after team of young and not-so-young evangeliststo-be are sent out from this campus and congregation to a world that desperately needs to know Jesus. After all, who better to obey His command, "Go into all the world," than this university named after a missionary, whose bronze arm outside our front door keeps pointing to the lost world that is our mission, too?

BLYTHE, EMMA LOU, MARGARITA

What do these names have in common? All these women composed music for organ, all earned doctorates in music, and all have been in the Berrien Springs area, among other things in common! Two are living, and two served long terms in Seventh-day Adventist higher education: Dr. Margarita Merriman at Atlantic Union College and Dr. Blythe Owen (1898-2000) at Walla Walla

College and Andrews University. Both of them were prolific composers of sacred music, as was the third woman composer, Dr. Emma Lou Diemer. However, Dr. Diemer has composed especially aptly for organ based on many years experience as a church organist. This trio's compositions in worship today represent a small subset of the creativity and quality that women bring to worship music.

GROWING TRUE DISCIPLES

Opportunities & Challenges in Raising the Next Generation of Believers



WITH DR. GEORGE BARNA—George Barna is a Christian Researcher that has held executive positions in advertising, public policy, political campaigns, and media/marketing research. He began his own company, The Barna Group, in 1984. Barna Group is a visionary research and resource company and is widely considered to be a leading research organization focused on the intersection of faith and culture.

Wednesday, November 14 • 7–8:30 PM • Pioneer Memorial Church "Revolutionary Parenting"—Session is approx. 80 minutes long

This session describes some of the emphases that relate to how parents facilitate a lifelong devotion to serving God through one's gifts and abilities. Barna will discuss why ministry to children matters; what the Bible says about raising kids; common but ineffective parenting strategies; and the practices of effective parents. Based on research among young adults who have grown up to serve the Lord, and interviews with their parents.






