The story of the explosive racial divide of Ferguson, Missouri, (exposed last week by the shooting death of an unarmed African-American teenager by a white policeman) has become the headline of the world. For all of our nation's rhetoric about the liberty and freedom of democracy and the American dream and the pursuit of happiness and equal rights for all citizens, we have become an enigma to the editorial talking heads of the international press. I.e., in their eyes, what we preach we don't practice.

The economic blogging website Zero Hedge carried a piece this week: "Why So Much Anger In Ferguson? 10 Facts About The Massive Economic Gap Between White & Black America." It opens with, "When people feel like they don't have anything else to lose, they are likely to do just about anything." And it concludes with, "I wish that I could be more optimistic

isneyland! For many the word evokes immediate memories of anticipation and fun. Since I grew up in Southern California, there were frequent opportunities to visit Disneyland. My first faint memories of this "land of enchantment" come from soon after it opened in 1955. Although not many rides had been built, I remember Dumbo the flying elephant and the Mad Hatter tea cups. Each ride was a different experience; Dumbo went up in the air in circles and the tea cups could make one dizzy! On subsequent visits I rode on Mr. Toad's Wild Ride, which was a 2-seat car on a track with sharp turns, scary visuals, and sounds to match. Eventually the Matterhorn was built and just like the other rides, once you were strapped in and started, you couldn't get off until the end.

In many ways Andrews University is a ride. For students returning, it is somewhat a repeat experience. For others, the ride is a new thing, full of anticipation, excitement, and maybe even a little fear of the unknown. Last Sabbath (August 16th) there was a dedication to God of those faculty and staff responsible for creating a safe, profitable, and spiritual ride. And the weekend before that (August 3rd) was the end of the Andrews University ride for many students, but the beginning of their own ride.

But the ride at Andrews is only a preparation—a dry run—for the ultimate ride. When, during the school year—or like the graduates on August

3—you eventually leave Andrews, you will need to decide if you will ride with God the rest of your life or not; whether you love and trust Him with His purpose for your life. Unlike the Matterhorn, the ride God offers is free. requires only your response to His offer of love to "get on," and even has a "stop" button. For you see, God's love neither forces you to get on, nor stay on. If you listen closely this coming school year, you will hear many voices on campus proclaiming the value and excitement of their ride with God. When you make the decision to yield to God's purposes for your life, be prepared to hang on for the ride of your life!

N2N / 100 YEARS OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

If you have lived in Berrien Springs for several decades, you probably remember the long-awaited day when the Adventist Community Services moved from its crowded conditions on 202 N Main Street to the present location on St. Joseph Avenue. That exciting move was made on Sunday, November 22, 1970, and for the next four months, there was much activity that took place. Joe Iverson and son Jack were busy building shelves and hanging doors in the work area. Others were laying carpet, sanding and painting. At the Open House on March 28, 1971, ladies dressed in uniforms served as guides to take groups through the 6,600 square-foot building which included an all-purpose room for nutrition classes and other health-related events. Nearly 500 guests came. U.S. Congressman Jerry Pattis of California (the only SDA in Congress) was one of the guests, as well as Michigan State Representative Harry Gast, Berrien Springs Mayor Edgar Kesterke, and Forrest Jewell, the Sheriff and Director of Civil Defense for Berrien County.

Later the ministry's name was changed to Neighbor to Neighbor and several additions were made to the original building. At the present time, we have a total of 11,422 square feet that are being extremely well utilized.

On <u>September 18th</u> of this year, Neighbor to Neighbor will be celebrating 100 years of continuous organized community service work in Berrien County by the Seventhday Adventist Church. Plan now to come to the <u>Open House (3 to 6 PM)</u> and see what God has done.

about the future of this country. I wish that I could believe that we won't see a tremendous amount of chaos in the streets of America in the years ahead."

And in between those lines the blogger lists "10 startling facts" about the economic racial divide in this nation: (1) for decades "the unemployment rate for black Americans has consistently been more than twice as high as . . . for white Americans" (July 2014-11.4% v 5.3%); (2) African Americans also have an "underemployment rate" twice as high as white workers (20.5% v 11.8%); (3) a 2012 study reported that "the average white household has 22 times as much wealth as the average black household": (4) African-American households, 13% of the population, "receive more than 26% of the food stamp benefits"; (5) high school graduation rates reflect the racial divide (82% for white students, 63.5% for black students); (6) Pew Research reports that the "income gap" between the two races "has continued to grow ever since the late 1960s" (the difference in media household incomes growing from around \$19,000 to "roughly \$27,000" in 2011 [measured in 2012] dollars]): (7) in this nation 12% of white children live in "areas of concentrated poverty" v 45% of African-American children; (8) the percentage of children living in single parent homes is 19.9% for white children, 52.1% for black children; (9) since 1960 the decline of the percentage of adults getting married has been from 74% to 55% for whites and from 61% to 31% for blacks; and (10) "the incarceration rate for black men is more than six times higher than it is for white men." (http://www.zerohedge.com/news/2014-08-19/why-so-much-anger-ferguson-10-facts-about-massive-economic-gap-between-white-black-a)

How does the church of Christ live with disparities like this? When Jesus declared that "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39) is the second half of "no commandment greater than these" (Mark 12:31), what was He trying to tell us? When Desire of Ages pronounces that—"[in the final iudament1 their [our] eternal destiny will be determined by what they [we] have done or have neglected to do for Him [Christ] in the person of the poor and the suffering" (637)—what does that tell us about our responsibility in Ferguson or America? Or how about Benton Harbor, twelve miles up the road from us?



What difference will the racially diverse student body of Andrews University make this new school year? How will we respond to this "massive economic gap"? What would Jesus do if He were a student or a faculty member on this campus?

Makes you wonder, doesn't it?

PRAYER MINISTRY




PMC OFFICE CLOSED


