CARING FOR 'THE LEAST OF THESE'

In the fall of 2013, a small group of people gathered together, hoping to engage in a process of searching and learning about God's call for each Christian to care for the children, for the fatherless, for the orphan. They were one of the groups that gather every semester as a GROW group, hoping to fulfill Pioneer Memorial Church's mission of CONNECT • GROW • SERVE • GO. They met faithfully throughout the semester, studying the Bible and heeding God's call. Soon, what began as a small GROW group back then has transformed into a full-time ministry today: God's Hands 4 Kids.

The group spent extensive time contemplating the meaning of James 1:27 to Christians who want to live "true religion":

"Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world" (James 1:27 NIV).

After countless hours of contemplation, prayer, and reflection, the group began to heed the call of God on their lives. They began to spread awareness about our

calling as Christians to care for the orphan, recruiting foster families and engaging in a number of projects to help foster children.

At the end of the semester, the GROW group had completed their scheduled number of meetings, but each of them

knew that they could not just stop. "We felt that now that we knew what the Bible says about caring for the orphan, we could not turn our backs on 'the least of these' and go back to our comfortable American lives," explains Carol Jordan, God's Hands 4 Kids founder. "So we continued to meet regularly. We registered with the county as a business and continued what we had already begun."

God's Hands 4 Kids organizes, assists, and contributes to a variety of projects in hopes of creating more opportunities to

reach out to families and care for children in the foster system. They have supported a pillow drive initiated by some foster teens based on their personal experience. They have organized an end-of-year move-out collection where they collected items that students want to discard at the end of the year. They are currently working with a

few churches in the county under the leadership of the First Church of God in St. Joe in a mentorship program for older teens. God's Hands 4 Kids offers its members, as well as the community, numerous ways to get involved and practice God's call to care for the orphan.

The ministry works closely with the Berrien County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) in order to reach foster children and foster families with their work. Hanna Lei-Sam, the Community Resource Coordinator of DHHS, notes the amazing work of God's Hands 4 Kids: "They have come through time and time again for this agency in so many ways." She emphasizes how grateful she is for the ministry's commitment "to the neediest of the needy in our County."

Carol Jordan and her husband took notice of God's call on their lives to care for the orphan some thirty years ago. They adopted a baby girl from India, Natasha, who grew up and felt the same call from God. After feeling a tug on her heart from God, Natasha became a licensed foster parent and the Jordan household

became a licensed home. In the last nine years, the Jordan household has fostered 20 children, with Natasha adopting three and a fourth adoption in the process. Their household overflows with Christ's love as they care for the children who come their way, going above and beyond what is required, but they are not alone.

Carol and Natasha Jordan founded God's Hands 4 Kids to provide opportunities for others to heed God's call. In order to truly fulfill God's call to care for the children, for the fatherless, and for the orphan, God's Hands 4 Kids reaches out for your help. Whether you want to become a foster home or you want to assist in a project, your contribution will affect the lives of individuals who desperately need to feel the love of God. The Student Missions program is excited to be sending out 20 SMs/Taskforce workers across the globe in the next couple of months to be serving during the 2015-2016 school year! We are thrilled to have such enthusiastic young adults ready to be teachers,

medical workers, Bible workers, deans, farmers, and more while showing Jesus to those around them. Sharon Redondo, one of our soon-to-be SMs, says, "I had the desire for a long time to go as a student missionary. Even though I tried different times, it seemed like the process didn't

work out. This year, God opened the door for me to go and serve. I like things to work at my time, but I am learning to follow the words of Psalm 46:10 that says, "Be still, and know that I am God." Our 20 SMs/Taskforce workers will be serving in places like Chile, Brazil, Ireland, New Zealand, Egypt, Philippines, Palau, Peru, South Korea, and the USA and are actively fundraising at the moment in order to make this possible.

While we are eagerly anticipating sending out these fresh faces to their respective destinations, we are also awaiting the return of those SMs who have been out during the 2014-2015 school year. They are starting to trickle back into the USA during these summer months, and we have already been hearing how much they enjoyed and grew during their year. Some have enjoyed themselves so much they have begun the process of extending their time to serve another year!

In the meantime, we here at Andrews are preparing for how we can best support current SMs, while continuing to encourage other students to become future SMs, as well as growing the program in general. Our goal is to create a culture of missions here at Andrews University, to make missions part of the intentional thought process of students as they make their academic plans when first arriving on campus. Wouldn't it be amazing if we ran out of places that needed SMs because we had so many students coming to our office saying that they want to give a year of their time to serve? In order to do that, we need to start having more conversations around campus and the general southwest Michigan area about missions.

We hope to visit many of the local churches and fellowships over the next few months and present the goals and needs of the Student Missions program, as

well as to share some experiences of returned student missionaries. Serving as a student missionary is a life-changing experience. Nathan Verrill is one SM who can attest to this. He served on the island of Pohnpei during the 2014-2015 school year and states that, "Although I enjoyed my SM year on the tropical island of Pohnpei for all of the obvious reasons such as endless summer weather, snorkeling, and saltwater, it was really the warmth and joy that I found in the people I lived and worked with that made my student missionary experience so memorable. I would highly recommend student missions to anyone who is seeking an opportunity to put their faith into action!"

CHILDHOOD THEN AND NOW

Celebrating the Lives and Service of Elder & Mrs. Eric B. Hare

A few of us remember reading or hearing recorded mission stories told by Eric B. Hare, a pioneer in the Adventist work among the Karen people of Burma. This year Karen Adventists in North America are celebrating the 100th anniversary of the arrival of Eric B. Hare as a missionary to Burma. 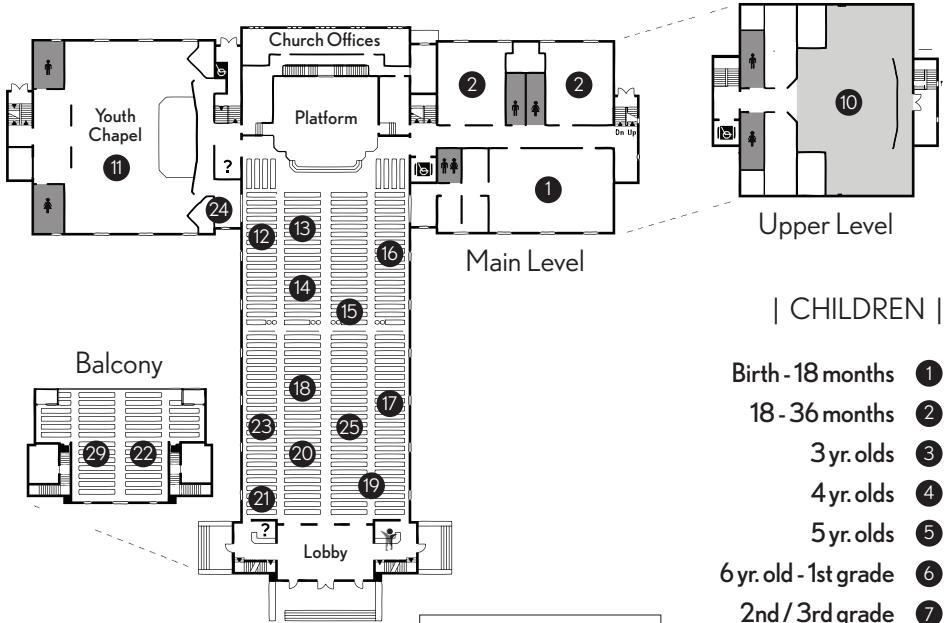

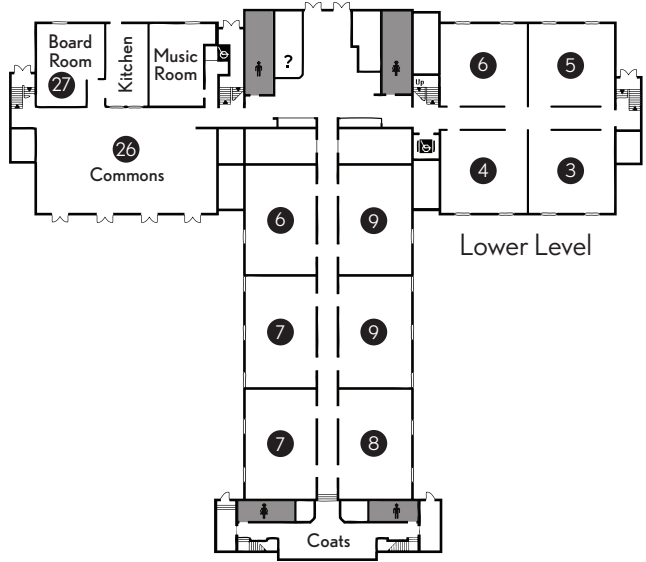

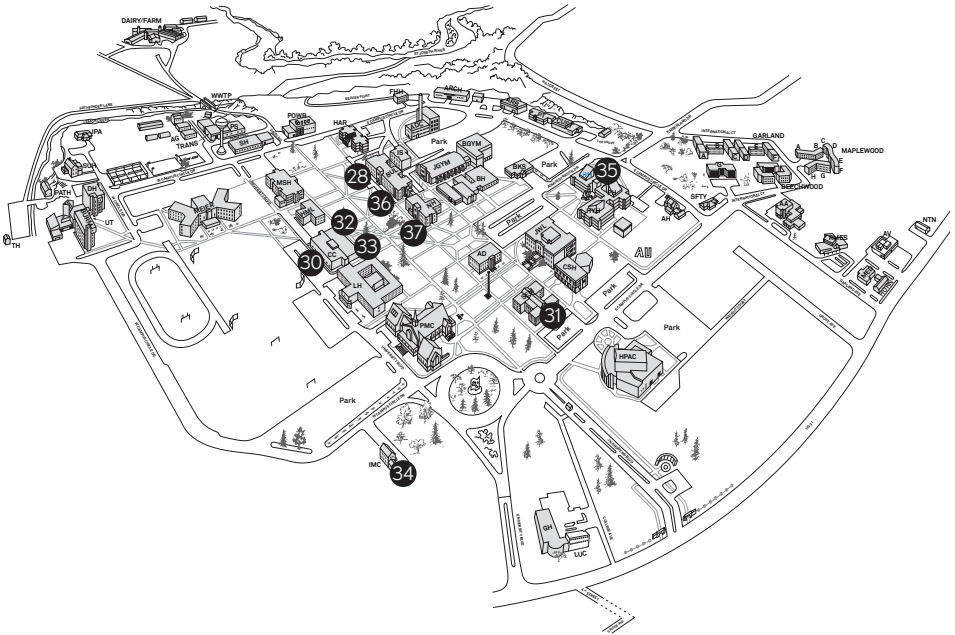
