ast week a friend gave me Carl Wilkens' provocative first-person account—I'm Not Leaving: Rwanda through the Eyes of the Only American to Remain in the Country through the 1994 Genocide. In his disturbing recital of what it was like to survive "the most tragic one hundred days of the twentieth century," young Carl Wilkens—country director for Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) at the time—struggles to come grips with what he witnessed, the genocide extermination of over 800,000 Tutsi men, women and

children-most of them hacked to death by machetes.

He describes the surging emotions of that moment when he watched the vehicle, bearing his wife and their three young children, disappear around the corner, tight on the tail of one lone UNAMIR tank (United Nations Assistance Mission in Rwanda), their escort to safety outside the city and country. Because of his decision to refuse the U.S. embassy evacuation, he was asked to send a signed and dated note with his family: "I have refused the help of



the United States government to leave Rwanda."

Years later he still wrestles with the choices so many made during this genocidal crisis:

"When I think about choices, I think about what Holocaust survivor and author Viktor Frankl wrote in his book Man's Search for Meaning: 'We who lived in concentration camps can remember the men who walked through the huts comforting others, giving away their last piece of bread. They may have been few in number, but they offer sufficient proof that everything can be taken from a man but one thing: the last of the human freedoms—to choose one's attitude in any given set of circumstances, to choose one's own way." (33)

And therein lies a promise for every graduate in this Class of 2018—no one can take away from you the freedom to choose your own attitude. Like Wilkens, you will face radical life-changing decisions (at a pace now much faster than you may have anticipated). But no matter the successes or crises on the road ahead, the truly great news is that you will face them all in tandem with the God of the

universe who has been charting your future for quite some time now.

And He has a Book full of YES CAN DO promises for you:

- "What god is there in heaven or on earth who CAN DO the deeds and mighty works You do?" —Deuteronomy 3:24
- "I know You CAN DO all things; no purpose of Yours can be thwarted."—Job 42:2
- "I CAN DO all things through Christ who strengthens me." —Philippians 4:13
- "Now to Him who CAN DO immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine!"—Ephesians 3:20

The good news is **you CAN DO** because **He CAN DO**.

So our collective prayer for you is a simple one: May the same Jesus who was with you here be with you there—your CAN DO Friend and Lord with His CAN DO future and life—"immeasurably more than all you ask or imagine." To which I add my fervent Amen.

THE TENT

t was May 9, 2014, and the butterflies were fluttering in the stomachs of Ruth Murdoch Elementary School's junior-high students. Earlier in the week, a tent had been pitched on the Andrews campus and this was to be the very first night of The Tent. For months junior-high students had been preparing to present an evangelistic series to the community, and now it was time. Claudia Applewhite, the first night's speaker, spoke on "The Empire's

Revolt." The meeting was a great success. From that small beginning, The Tent has been a regular springtime event on the campus of Andrews University.

The Tent began as a dream of then seminary student Ben Martin. Working in cooperation with the school administration, the junior-high faculty, and with financial support from the North American Division Children's Ministries Department, the dream of a series of evangelistic

meetings led by junior-high students became a reality. The concept of teenage young people becoming actively involved in spreading the gospel is not new, but it is often underutilized.

How does a program like this keep going year after year? It takes commitment and cooperation from the home, the church, and the school. Students give up their spare time to study and prepare their sermons, and it is the students who prepare the sermons, not adults. The first year I was talking to a parent, a seminary professor. I asked him how much he had helped with his child's sermon. The response, "No, my child didn't even let me see it." That does not mean, however, that parents do not support and encourage their children as they prepare. Sermons, special music, and the many other things that go into making The Tent a success require hours of dedicated preparation with encouragement from Mom and Dad. Parents provide transportation for their children and support as they attend the meetings themselves. The church family provides support for the meetings through their financial assistance, their attendance, and their prayers. PMC pastors encourage the students and show their support by their attendance.

The PMC youth pastor works with the school, providing instruction, encouragement, and coordination for the event. The school faculty spends hours of their own time after school helping students prepare and practice their sermons. It takes the combined support of all of these, family, school, and church, to make The Tent a continuing success.

But the question comes, "Why do

we do it?" It does take a lot of time, effort and money to make The Tent a success. Is it worth it? I would suggest there are a number of significant reasons which make The Tent an important program. First of all preparing and presenting an evangelistic series provides important training to our young people. The Lord's messenger says, "Educate the youth to help the youth; and in seeking to do this work each will gain experience that will qualify him [her] to become a consecrated worker in a larger sphere. Thousands of hearts can be reached in the most simple way" (MYP 203.3).

Another objective of The Tent is to provide an outreach opportunity to the young people in public schools, young people leading young people to Christ. Again, the pen of inspiration says, "Preachers, or laymen advanced in years, cannot have one-half the influence upon the young that the youth, devoted to God, can have upon their associates" (MYP 204.1).

We do it to keep our youth involved. The sad reality is that we lose more than half of our youth in their 20's. Some internet research will tell you that there are many factors to blame, but productive involvement in leading others to Christ is definitely a positive factor.

We invite you to be a part of this great program. Here are three easy steps. First, set aside May 11-19, 2018, to attend this year's Tent. Second, mark The Tent on an offering envelope and provide financial support for this year's program. Third, pray for the young people who are even now preparing to participate this year. We hope to see you at The Tent.




