DOES AMERICA STILL BELIEVE?

n Tuesday the Pew Research Center released its 2014 Religious Landscape Study, a survey of over 35,000 Americans. Coming seven years after Pew's previous such study, the new survey offers some intriguing comparisons.

According to Gregory Smith, Pew's associate director of research: "We should remember that the United States remains a nation of believers with nearly 9 in 10 adults saying they believe in God" (USA)

Today 11-14-15). But that statistic represents a three point drop from 92% in 2007 to today's 89%, leading Pew on its website to ask: "Is the American public

becoming less religious?" In response to its own question Pew offers a two-part answer. "Yes, at least by some key measures of what it means to be a religious person. [This] new survey . . . finds that the percentages who say they believe in God, pray daily and regularly go to church or other religious services all have declined modestly in recent years" (www.pewforum.org/2015/11/03/u-s-public-becoming-less-religious/).

Then Pew offers a second analysis of its numbers: "But [this] study also finds a great deal of stability in the U.S. religious landscape. The recent decrease in religious beliefs and behaviors is largely attributable to the 'nones'—the growing minority of Americans, particularly in the Millennial generation, who say they do not belong to any organized faith. Among the roughly three-quarters of U.S. adults who do claim a religion, there has been no discernible drop in most measures of religious commitment. Indeed, by some conventional measures, religiously affiliated Americans are, on average, even more devout than they were a few years ago" (ibid).

Intriguing, isn't it? The number of religiously affiliated Americans is down,


but numbers measuring the depth of devotion among the religiously affiliated are up.

How do these numbers inform our faith community's mission to share the

Bible's hope-filled message of Jesus and His return?

#1–We need a proactive strategy to connect with America's "nones." As noted above the Pew Center finds a growing number of Millennials populating this turn from organized religion. And yet notice their openness to spiritual themes: "The study also suggests that in some ways Americans are becoming more spiritual. About six-in-ten adults now say they regularly feel a deep sense of 'spiritual peace and well-being,' up 7 percentage points since 2007. And 46% of Americans say they experience a deep sense of 'wonder about the universe' at least once a week, also up 7 points over the

"IS THE AMERICAN PUBLIC BECOMING LESS RELIGIOUS?"




same period" (ibid). How can we connect with this latent spiritual dimension of this generation's psyche? Clearly our personal witness, as well as our public evangelism, need to touch America's "nones" at the place of their heart-longing. We need to tell the story of Jesus all over again in the language of a new generation. We cannot expect our tried and true 20th century strategy of front-loading as many doctrines as possible into as few nights as possible to be the sure-fire method of effectively reaching America's "nones" and its young.

#2–But at the same time this new research reminds us America's religiously affiliated are "even more devout than they were a few years ago." Pew observes: "The portion of religiously affiliated adults who say they regularly read scripture, share their faith with others and participate in small prayer groups or scripture study groups all have increased modestly since 2007. And roughly four-in-ten re-

ligiously affiliated adults (41%) now say they rely mainly on their religious beliefs for guidance on questions about right and wrong, up 7 percentage points in seven years" (ibid). For this segment of the populace the overt public proclamation of and witness to the Bible and the Three Angels Messages (evangelism) can strike a responsive chord. They are Bible believers, after all. And of all faith communities, we bring a relevant Bible message whose time has come. We must share it even as we share Him.

The numbers are in. America is still open. But time is short. Let us then respond with prayer-bathed, old-time, cutting-edge faithfulness to Jesus' call: "Go and proclaim the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). ■

s Kevin sat on the edge of his bed writing a suicide note, he realized that he had never spoken about this to anyone. On the outside his friends and family saw a comedian, a successful basketball player, and an intelligent 17-year-old. Kevin later stated, "They would have no idea [that I was depressed]. And I thought, 'I can't quit on myself until I try and help myself. And it just broke me open."

In 2013, Kevin Breel's story went viral and he spoke at a TedTalk event to raise awareness about depression and to reduce the stigma of shame placed on it. Depression today has skyrocketed. High school and college students are five to eight times more likely to have major depression than they were 50 or 60 years ago. Contrary to what we would like to believe, Seventh-day Adventist youth are not safe from this condition of the mind. Suicide is the third most common reason for death in vouth in North America. In his book. Valuegenesis: Faith in the Balance, Roger Dudley suggests that "postmodern despair" has grasped SDA youth. It was reported that 47 percent of students in Adventist schools had depressive symptoms in the past month while 13 percent had attempted suicide at some point in the past.

In the book Getting It Right by the SDA General Conference, a general survey revealed that many SDA youth believed they needed to work their way to righteousness. Dudley suggested to "clarify the gospel" to our youth, teaching more clearly the righteousness by faith doctrine. Our methods must employ our message of love and reduce a law orientation. The emphasis on behavior in the church has given the impression to youth that their salvation is up to them and that they must figure out how to work for it.

One in ten North Americans are afflicted with depression. It is highly likely that you or someone you know is, has, or will, struggle with depression. Sometimes we may not even realize it. I didn't. I dealt with minor depression at one point due to the fact that every behavior and action I made was analyzed and criticized by those around me. We are not alone; many Bible characters also suffered from bouts of dark feelings. However there are three critical things that work better than almost any other prevention that everyone can do: Exercising daily (outside as often as possible), eating healthy and keeping our relationship with God clear of distractions. Don't do it alone. It's okay to lean on your friends and family for support or see a counselor if vou can. Lastly, we are often more harsh with ourselves than anyone else-so remember to stay gentle with yourself when you are stressed and struggling with life. It's emotionally and physically detrimental to ignore your emotions and shove them away as unimportant. A study from Harvard School of Public Health and the University of Rochester confirmed a strong correlation between suppressing emotions and getting heart disease or even certain forms of cancer. We all struggle. We are all imperfect. Remember the righteousness of Jesus covers you and by His grace alone we are saved. Second Timothy 1:7 says, "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." Release your fears and anxieties, your "to-do" lists and distress into His capable hands and receive the gift of a peaceful, sound mind.

n historic date occasioned an historic hymn. It was for July 4, 1876, that Daniel Crane Roberts wrote the text for "God of Our Fathers" for a celebration at Brandon, Vermont, of this prime centennial in United States history. New York-born Roberts was an army soldier in the Civil War. Receiving ordination as an Anglican deacon and then priest in 1865-1866, Roberts served churches in Vermont, Massachusetts, and

New Hampshire. His last church was in a location remembered for its significant role in American revolutionary history: St. Paul's Church of Concord, New Hampshire. Interestingly, Roberts' text originally was associated with the tune of the Russian national anthem known as RUSSIAN HYMN and found as hymn no. 84 in the Seventh-day Adventist Hymnal. Now we sing this text to George Warren's stirring hymntune.




