THE BURDENSOME NEIGHBOR

Right at the time when we are learning how to be good neighbors, we are blindsided by this verse, "Don't visit your neighbors too often, or you will wear out your welcome" (Proverbs 25:17 NLT). Another translation says, "Otherwise, he will see too much of you and hate you." Is it possible to know when you are visiting your neighbor too often? Here are a few things to remember when working with the Holy Spirit to be a better neighbor.

● "GIVE ME A BREAK!"

Too much of anything is not good. A portion of the fruit of the Spirit is temperance, and this should be exercised even when it comes to visits. Be mindful that those you visit need to have quality time with their families or have other work to do. Even if the neighbor you visit does not have a family, do not allow your presence to be a distraction and hinder them from getting important work done.

Your neighbor may insist that you stay longer or come earlier, but then the next day complain that they don't have enough time to complete tasks. Ask the Holy Spirit to impress you with an appropriate leaving time, and then gracefully excuse yourself. This shows that you are considerate of your neighbor's time, energy, resources, and quiet time with God. "Have you found honey? Eat only as much as you need, lest you be filled with it and vomit" (Proverbs 25:16).

2 DON'T MEDDLE

Matthew Henry's commentary on our main verse says, "It is wisdom, as well as good manners, not to be troublesome to our friends in our visiting them, not to visit too often, nor stay too long, nor contrive

to come at mealtime, nor make ourselves busy in the affairs of their families; hereby we make ourselves cheap, mean, and burdensome." As you spend more time with your neighbors, you will begin to notice quirks and flaws. You

will learn to distinguish subtle tension between the couple you visit, a carpet you would've vacuumed better, or the sharp tone with which the teenager answers his mother. You may be tempted not only to judge and abruptly correct, but also to hang your neighbor's dirty laundry on the church walls without regard to their feelings. Paul had to deal with this issue in the early church. Concerning certain widows he said, "Besides that, they learn to be idlers, going about from house to house, and not only idlers, but also gossips and busybodies, saying what they should not" (1 Timothy 5:13 ESV). Addressing this, the Lord says, "You shall not go around as a slanderer among your

people, and you shall not stand up against the life of your neighbor: I am the Lord" (Leviticus 19:16 ESV).

10 KNOCK ON GOD'S DOOR

Unfortunately, many have cultivated the habit of turning to their neighbors for the kind help that only God can provide. While it is not God's intention for every man to be an island, neither does he want us to form an archipelago independent of Him. There is a limit to how much support a neighbor can give emotionally, spiritually, or financially. While God wants us to support each other and bear each other's burdens, we are to remember that He is our first Source of help. He works through others to aid us when we are in need but many of us become so dependent on

our neighbors that we offend God and transform our neighbor's house into a shrine. The parable of the persistent friend at midnight reminds us that even though we can tire our neighbors and run the risk of being turned down

by them, God promises to leave His door open wide for us. We can never be too often at His house. He longs to provide for all of our needs and is never weary of our heartaches and pains. Rather than turning a neighbor into your personal psychiatrist, remember that God is always ready and willing to talk with you. Knock and His door will open to you. There's not another neighbor quite like our God.

DIVIDENDSOF ADVENTIST EDUCATION

ugust is just around the corner, and with it, the start of a new school year. As many of you are trying to decide where your child will attend school in the fall, it is our hope that you will read to the end of this article.

You have probably been questioning and praying about your options: "Why does my child need a Christian education? Should I enroll my child at Ruth Murdoch Elementary School even on a tight budget? Do I take my chance with the public school?"

While we do have to count the cost of Adventist education, I pray that your focus is not only on the immediate rewards but the eternal dividends. How gratifying it is when a child makes the decision for baptism because of what they learned in school!

Sam is a good example. He is the first born in the McKay family. His parents were not practicing Christians and, according to Mr. McKay, attended church "once in a while." However, they wanted a school where their son would learn about God. Their criteria included that of a private school, small class sizes, and a good reputation. After exploring their options, they enrolled him at an Adventist school.

Sam started at age five in Kindergarten. When he got to 2nd grade he requested baptism during Week of Prayer. His parents and teachers did not encourage his decision, but he persisted the following year. Again he requested baptism. He said he wanted to give his heart to Jesus. When his parents realized they could not change his mind they asked what they needed to do. The pastor was informed and, at age eight, Sam was baptized.

After completing 8th grade with the second highest GPA, his parents planned to enroll him in a public high school. This was not Sam's plan. He was set on going to the Adventist academy. Because of Sam's dedication, his parents attended church from time to time. When his baby sister was born they dedicated her at the Adventist church. Best of all, when Sam was in the 9th grade both of his parents accepted Jesus and were baptized. The McKays continue to invest in Adventist education. Sam's sister is now in Grade 5 at his alma mater.

Here, then, are 7 important reasons why not just a Christian education, but Adventist education is essential for our children.
