"THE HOUSE BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD"

Three people died this week: Don Kirshner, the veteran music mogul, hailed a "legend" for his creation and management of young rock groups in the 60s and 70s, including the Monkees; Sargent Shriver, described as the most influential non-elected politician in U.S. history, serving his brother-in-law John Kennedy's administration as head of the Peace Corp and leading the War on Poverty for President Lyndon Johnson; and, an unnamed and unknown elderly man in Mongolia. The first two are being feted in the national press for their portfolios of achievement. The third is remembered only by the family he loved and the village he served throughout his unnoticed, publicly unremarkable life.

Why consider the three? Because somewhere in our pantheon of cultural icons we as earth children have been fooled into the notion that the

"legends" created by the press, the media and the public's raucous clamor for the next "American Idol" are who matter most. But of course we know better ... don't we?

It was Jesus who acclaimed the anonymous and unfeted of humanity by especially recognizing "**whoever gives one of these little ones only a cup of cold water in the name of a disciple**" (Matthew 10:42). No public office, no tabloid headline—just the anonymous gift of a cool drink of water to some stranger in need. And it is that one, Jesus declared, who "shall by no means lose his [eternal] reward."

No wonder these words a century ago: "Do not shut yourselves up to yourselves, satisfied to pour out all your affection upon each other. Seize every opportunity to contribute to the happiness of those around you, sharing with them your affection. Words of kindness, looks of sympathy, expressions of appreciation, would to many a struggling, lonely one be as a cup of cold water to a thirsty soul. The cable message crackled “Saved Alone” across the Atlantic. In half an hour the *Ville du Havre* had sunk after impacting another ship. With it also sank to the depths Maggie, Tannetta, Annie and Bessie Spafford, the daughters of Horatio and Anna Spafford. Anna had been rescued and had landed in Wales, but not before surging waters ripped her baby from her arms and swept the child to her

death. As Horatio joined Anna across the ocean, they visited evangelist Dwight L. Moody, who comforted them in their sorrow while noting their trust and confidence in God. Two years later, Horatio Spafford affirmed his faith in the words “It Is Well With My Soul” (No. 530). Today, the GLAA Encore! Strings plays David Holsinger’s arrangement of the hymntune by Philip Bliss.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS MINISTRY

THE IMPORTANCE OF A VEGETARIAN DIET

Dr. Winston Craig and PMC's Health and Wellness Committee

A vegetarian diet may not be very popular. However, there are many reasons to try a vegetarian diet: improved health, decreased chances of contracting food-borne illnesses, and a greener environment.

Many scientific studies show that people who eat plant-based diets enjoy better health, suffer less heart disease and cancer, and live longer. Vegetarians enjoy lower levels of blood cholesterol and blood pressure, and lower rates of obesity and diabetes.

Food-borne illnesses linked to meat, poultry, dairy, and egg products cause over 1000 deaths yearly. Consumer Reports recently revealed that 1% of ground beef samples purchased at grocery stores had fecal contamination; 4% of the beef samples were on the brink of spoilage; more than half of all chickens leaving food processing plants are contaminated with *Campylobacter* bacteria; and 2.3 million eggs are contaminated with *Salmonella* yearly.

A vegetarian diet helps preserve the earth's resources. Every year 7 trillion gallons of water irrigates hay and alfalfa for animal feed. This volume of water exceeds the combined irrigation needs of all vegetables, berries, and fruit orchards. Methane and nitrous oxide are 20 and 300 times as po-

tent as carbon dioxide, a well-known greenhouse gas generated from automobiles and power plants. Cattle, and their decomposing manure, are major sources of the greenhouse gasses methane and nitrous oxide.

Most staples in a vegetarian diet are inexpensive, such as rice, beans, other grains, legumes, fruits and vegetables. Even though your \$1 cheeseburger is cheaper than a pound of apples, fiber found in fruits, vegetables, legumes, and grains, are more satiating than simple sugars and fried foods. So, even though we think we're saving money by eating fast-food, we tend to eat more after a fast-food meal because we don't "feel" full. In the meantime, a cheeseburger contains more sodium, sugar, fat, and overall calories than

a healthier option such as rice, beans, and a cup of veggies.

So, for a healthier body, a greener planet, lower weekly grocery bills, and other positive effects from a vegetarian diet, try consuming less animal products every week. Consult your physician if you have special dietary or needs or illnesses.

THE “SMALL VOICE”

Welcome to Spiritual Parenting for 2011! Parenting is a joy and a challenge. The purpose of Insights for Spiritual Parenting is to remind you of the joys and help with the challenges of our greatest privilege - encouraging our children to grow spiritually.

Many years ago, on a beautiful sunny morning in Puerto Rico, my fingers flew over the keys as I hurried to finish a writing deadline. It loomed over me like a dark worry cloud, blocking out everything else. Suddenly, in the midst of my concentration, a small voice whispered, “Go check on Nancy.”

“I don’t have time to go outside now. I’ve got to finish this before noon!” I said and I continued typing.

Five or 10 minutes later the voice again intruded on my concentration. “Go check on Nancy.”

“I don’t have time! I’ve got to finish this! I’m sure she’s OK.” And I continued typing.

Nancy loved to play outside. With her older brother at school, she often played alone all morning. Our large yard held endless possibilities for an inquisitive 5-year-old who loved bugs and animals and plants. It was the perfect place for a nature lover like Nancy.

Again the voice—more insistent now: “Go check on Nancy!”

This time the voice got my attention. Three times! I’d better go check on her!

As I stepped out the front door and looked around I spotted Nancy, sound asleep, lying on a retaining wall no more than eight inches wide. The drop on the other side of the wall was at least 12 feet. If she had moved during her sleep, she could easily have fallen and been seriously hurt. Quietly I glided toward her, gently touched her, and softly called her name. Her eyes opened to my smile, and we carefully moved off the wall.

“Thank you, Lord! Thank you for guardian angels, and thank you

for Your persistence!”

Have you ever wished you could be with your child 24/7 to protect her? The Holy Spirit and your child’s guardian angel can be. They’re eager to let you know what they know and to prompt you to God-dependent parenting through that “small voice.”

Maybe in the midst of a relaxing evening, you feel a sudden impression (“small voice”) that you should call your young teen who is at a party. When you call you hear concern in her voice. Immediately you are on your way to pick her up.

Your seven-year-old explodes into the house after school asking



a question about sex. It sounds like he knows much more than you thought he did. How should you respond? And then suddenly sentences flash through your mind (“small voice”). Those sentences turn out to be exactly the words your son needs to hear. You watch relief flood his face as you hug.

You feel impressed (“small voice”) to select a particular story for evening bedtime. Your child is much too quiet while you read the story. At the end you say, “Is there something you’d like to tell Daddy?” Dead silence and then a sniffling voice pours out a concern that needs Daddy’s help.

Do you want to hear the “small voice” prompting you more frequently? Seek a closer connection with God. It’s your vital link to that “small voice”. Do what you have to

do to rearrange your day so you have some time alone with God. Meditate on a verse from His Word. Pray for yourself as a parent and for each of your children. Continue throughout the day with quick sentence prayers. God has promised to hear and respond.






