THE TORNADO

The tornados that swept through, to the south of us a few days ago, leaving vast swaths of devastation and death, also left behind a collection of stories for the ages. Like the one about Latonya Stevens who heard the thunder and lightning in the distance, ran for her four children, but mysteriously passed out—and when she came to, the roof was gone, and so were three of her children—who were found up to a hundred feet away, with only cuts and bruises and a story to tell for the rest of their lives!

Not so fortunate another young mother, Stephanie Decker, who was at home with her two children when the deadly twister struck their three-story brick house in Marysville, Indiana. Her husband, a high school math teacher, had been texting her to get the children into the basement. She texted back that

know that I'm to die soon; the Master has made that quite clear to me. And so I am especially eager that you have all this down in black and white so that after I die, you'll have it for ready reference. ...

through Since Jesus went everything you're going through and more, learn to think like him. Think of your sufferings as a weaning from that old sinful habit of always expecting to get your own way. Then you'll be able to live out your days free to pursue what God wants instead of being tyrannized by what you want. ... Listen to the Message. It was preached to those believers who are now dead. and yet even though they died (just as all people must), they will still get in on the life that God has given in Jesus.

Everything in the world is about to be wrapped up, so take nothing for granted. Stay wide-awake in praver. Most of all, love each other as if your life depended on it. Love makes up for practically anything. Be quick to give a meal to the hungry, a bed to the homeless—cheerfully. Be generous with the different things God gave you, passing them around so all get in on it: if words, let it be God's words: if help, let it be God's hearty help. That way, God's bright presence will be evident in everything through Jesus, and he'll get all the credit as the One mighty in everything—encores to the end of time!

Friends, when life gets really difficult, don't jump to the conclusion that God

isn't on the job. Instead, be glad that you are in the very thick of what Christ experienced. This is a spiritual refining process, with glory just around the corner. If you're abused because of Christ, count yourself fortunate. It's the Spirit of God and his glory in you that brought you to the notice of others. If they're on you because you broke the law or disturbed the peace, that's a different matter. But if it's because you're a Christian, don't give it a second thought. ively little bodies settle onto the mats in a circle around the felt board. On the board the ark rests all alone in a bleak landscape. But soon a felt angel comes to open its door and felt animals march across the board: lions and elephants, donkeys and rabbits. It is lesson time in 3 year-old Sabbath School.

For everyone in this Sabbath School where the children are three years old or have just turned four, the felts acquired about four years ago still seem new and exciting. Hours of dedicated and painstaking cutting by volunteers produced six sets of more than 200 figures, well over 1,500 felts: patriarchs and disciples, angels and figures of Jesus, clouds and lightning, trees and animals, and a whole collection of little pieces—crowns and sticks and flames and clay pots and sacks of grain, to name just a few.

The vibrant colors and the variety of images and interesting backgrounds help to capture the attention of the young listeners as they hear and watch the weekly Bible story unfold. They love to add pieces to the board

themselves—stars in the sky or animals coming out of the ark.

"And what did God put up in the sky when He made His promise to Noah?"

"A rainbow!!" they all shout. The last felt goes up on the board; it's a brilliant banner of many colors. "Oooohhhh! That's pretty!"

"Does God promise to take care of us?"

"Yes!"

D y this point, most of the church **b** has heard the results from iPerceive, but in case you hadn't heard, here they are—we had 21 precious people make decisions for baptism or profession of faith! We praise God for His mighty work. Here are a few lessons that we'd like to highlight as a result of the meetings:

- 1. A nine night series works well in this era. There used to be times when an evangelistic series would be two months long and people would actually attend. We're of course living in different times now. People are extremely busy and it's difficult to hold people's attention. Most types of series like this are still about a month long and here's the truth about them—people get tired. The evangelistic gets tired. But, yet, attendance held very strongly over the entire nine nights of this series.
- 2. The work doesn't finish when the meetings are over. It's easy to think that once the evangelist has finished his last sermon and people have made the decisions to be baptized, that the work is done. In a sense, that's when the work is actually beginning. You see,

some people will make a decision for baptism when confronted with truth and conviction, but once they return home, reality sets in. That's why we're grateful for the students and church members that are working with the interests, helping them understand the importance of following through with their decision.

3. Attendance from the church makes a difference. We were extremely grateful for the support and attendance from Pioneer Memorial Church. You all came night after night and kept the seats full. This makes a big difference for the evangelist as well as the attender. You see, they don't know that you're not a first time guest. When they see you there they think—"Wow, this is important. This place is packed. I guess I need to keep coming!"

Sabbath hours were filled with

singing, sharing, group and personal Bible study and Bible charades. Some creative activities in the afternoon helped the young people think about their personal relationship with God and identify what was hindering them from a closer walk with Him. They considered Jesus' words, "Lo, I am with you always." The day ended with a vespers at the peaceful and picturesque Hartwick Pines State Park.

the whole house was shaking. And then no further messages. Turns out Stephanie had spotted the tornado moving across their acreage toward the house, had tied both children to her and each other with a blanket and then instinctively threw herself on top of the children as the tornado exploded into their home. When the mayhem passed, the house was collapsed. The young mother was pinned, her legs crushed by the fallen debris. Neighbors called for help, a deputy sheriff applied tourniquets, she was rushed to a local hospital, then airlifted to the University of Louisville hospital, where it was determined she had lost both legs, one above the knee and the other above the ankle. And the children? Unscathed. Saved by their mother's sacrificial action. Said her husband, "I told her, "They're here because of vou." (South Bend Tribune 3-6-12)

Which, as it turns out, is true of all of us, isn't it? We're here because of the sacrificial action of One who threw His body over us, "who loved [us] and gave Himself for [us]" (Galatians 2:20). We're here because of Calvary, where Christ Jesus lost more than His legs in saving this world.

But the tornado? The ancient narrative of Job describes how the adversary of the human race (ha satan) harnesses the fury of the wind to destroy human possessions, human life—"and suddenly a great wind came" (Job 1:18, 19). The great winds of a tornado offer precious little time for preparation—sometimes



only split seconds. Moments earlier life was copasetic—and then suddenly the world is upside down.

The point, like a tornado, is inescapable. Those who survive the fury of the wind are the ones who monitor the signs, who in a time of storm maintain heightened alert, who have in place emergency preparations for the eventuality. Through ancient Ezekiel God issues this end of the world alert: "Thus says the Lord GOD: 'A disaster, a singular disaster; behold, it has come! An end has come, the end has come; it has dawned for you; behold, it has come!" (Ezekiel 7:5, 6). Like a tornado!

Which, of course, is the other point. Because "like a tornado" means you never really know. If you live in Tornado Alley (as all of earth's inhabitants now do), you must live in prepared expectancy. To live unprepared is to spurn the gift of the One who lost more than His legs to save us from the impending storm.

MUSIC ALIVE

A HYMN MELODY, AND LEARNING ONE

The hymn "Holy, Holy, Holy" witnesses to the glorious scene in Revelation 4:8-11a: "They rest not day and night, saying, Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, which was, and is, and is to come. . . . The four and twenty elders fall down before him . . . and cast their crowns before the throne, saying, Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power:..." Charles Callahan's meditative—even mystical—organ

setting is heard at service end today. At service beginning (8:15) or end (11:20) is imaginative music on "shaped-note melodies." Shaped notes frequently were used in early America to learn to sing a given hymn melody. Different shapes corresponded to different singing pitches (with possibly some repetition of shapes), and such shapes often characterized singing schools that focused on learning hymns.

THE VALUE OF A PENNY

BUT WHAT ARE THEY AMONG SO MANY? JOHN 6:9



On a grassy hill overlooking the Sea of Galilee a vast multitude had gathered to see Jesus. Caught up in His presence, the

beauty of nature, and the experience of a Heavenly peace, the crowd was unaware that they had eaten nothing all day.

To test the disciples, Jesus asked them to feed the large gathering. Philip replied that even "two hundred pennyworth" would not buy a little bit for each one. Andrew noted that a young lad had a lunch of loaves and fishes, but questioned – "What are they among so many?"

Jesus directed that the five loaves and two fishes – and presumably the boy – be brought to him. Looking to heaven, Jesus blessed the food and after breaking it passed it to the disciples and in turn to the crowd until "they were filled".

On February 27 our church body in business session considered and approved a 2012 operating budget. The budget includes specific Family Finance goals totaling \$1,083,323 that will be used to fund the core ministry of PMC. The scope of this budget is evidence of the great need and the value placed on it. As we consider our individual resources – our mere pennies – do we like the disciples question "what are they among so many?"

True, a penny is not worth much, but as we are faithful in combining our

pennies, God has promised to multiply the result with His blessing. Consider that one penny per member per day for a year would total \$13,373.60. This amount would fund any one of the following: Sabbath School supplies for Cradle Roll thru Earliteen for one year, Youth Ministry for one year, WHME 46 New Perceptions air time for ten weeks, Pathfinders and Adventures for six months, or Sabbath meals at Harbor of Hope for a whole year.


Interesting, but how many pennies would be needed to fund our entire Family Finance budget? Surprisingly, only 81 cents per member per day. That's right, the entire budget for church operating, evangelism, Christian education, student aid and our building fund – over one million dollars - could be funded with just 81 cents per day.


Little is known about the young boy. We do know that before his very eyes those loaves and fishes were multiplied in a miraculous way. What a blessing this experience must have been to him during his life. To have been in the presence of the Master and possibly to have helped break the bread, to have joined in His work was most certainly a life changing blessing.

Today we have that same opportunity, each one according to ability, but equally called to join in a work that will transform the lives of others as well as our own. Please prayerfully consider the value of our collective "pennies" when placed in the hands of the Master for His work.


