BLACK FRIDAY, DARK NIGHT

'm afraid I have to agree with the blogger who commented: "Black Friday—the most embarrassing day of the year for me as an American." He then embedded in his blog someone's video clip of shoppers in a real, live melee at Wal-Mart last Friday. Embarrassing? You be the judge (http://libertyblitzkrieq.com/).

perhaps But even more embarrassing is the latest sales report from retailers. With businesses opening on Thanksgiving night (kudos to the financial genius who came up with that novel suggestion), the weekend total for US retail sales was \$59.1 billion, up 13% from the year before. Because of our massive national indebtedness of \$16+ trillion, I realize that the figure you just read may seem paltry in comparison. But look at that number again: \$59.1 billion. Do you know

ools are objects we use every day to accomplish our work, cook and eat meals, even play and relax. The interesting thing about tools is that they are always designed for a specific task. A belt sander has a specific use that should not be confused with a computer keyboard. Neither should it be replaced by an orbital hand sander. If you were to try to use a sledge hammer and splitting wedge in the reverse configuration, the wedge would never be able to coax the sledge hammer into splitting a log. However, when used properly, two or three swings of the sledge hammer will easily drive the wedge into the log, dividing it in two.

This is the principle that Paul uses in 1 Corinthians 12:12-31—that each part of the body has a specific function and sphere of influence. When this principle is applied to the church, each member has unique skills, experiences, interests, human connections, and potential impact. Unfortunately, many in the church—especially in large churches-tend to think that if they are not actively involved, someone else will pick up the slack. However, this is not reality. In large churches it is just as important that each member is actively working in some capacity as in small churches. Because of the unique abilities of each person, projects only that member can do with optimal efficiency are either left undone or accomplished by another who may

not be fully prepared by God to fulfill. That orbital sander can be used to approximate the work of the belt sander, but it will take much longer and the results will never be the same.

If we can think of the church as a toolbox in the hands of the Master Carpenter, what tool are you? Have you been sharpened today and ready for work, or do you have some rust that needs to be cleaned off? Are you the grinding stone that sharpens other tools, or the can of oil that keeps other tools running smoothly without squeaks? Are you the axe that is used to gather more wood into the Carpenter's shop, or the plane that takes rough edges off planks?

This leads to the most important question, what tool do I use to become a tool in the Carpenter's toolbox? The answer is found in Luke 11:9,10 "Ask, and God will give to you . . .search, and you will find . . .knock, and the door will open for you." [Easy-to-Read Version]

Use God's tool of prayer every day to become a productive tool in the hands of the Carpenter.

As the plane was about to take flight, I buckled my seatbelt then turned to my wife and said, "We're never coming back here again. And that means no more snow!" Well, just as surely as you are reading this, my wife and I currently live in snowy Benton Harbor, where I serve as senior pastor of Harbor of Hope (HOH) SDA Church. How did that happen?

I first attended HOH in September 2008, while a seminary student. I was impressed with Pastor Walter and the church's vision for reaching children for Christ. For two and a half years I worked with Benton Harbor teens in a variety of ways. Two of the most memorable were the basketball ministry and the mission trip to Guyana. As a result, four young people were baptized!

Upon my graduation in 2010, I had a pastoral assignment awaiting me in the snowless and warm state of Mississippi where I had the honor of pastoring the church that was founded by Adventist pioneer Edson White. About 15 months into my ministry, I received a call from HOH asking if I'd be interested in coming back to serve as senior pastor. My immediate response was, "No!" But over time I began to pray about it. That's when it became clear to me that God wanted my family and me to return to Benton Harbor. I often tell others that I was born for this parish! Being from an innercity setting helped prepare me for this responsibility. God has set me free from drugs, alcohol, and a host of other chains, which enables me to speak to the issues I see others struggling with.

My vision for Harbor of Hope is to see kids, teens, and parents living passionately for Jesus. I envision a church where young people can continuously grow into mature followers of Jesus Christ. I especially want to see families empowered by God's Spirit to be agents of grace in our community. By God's grace and with your continued financial and spiritual support we shall see the vision come to pass.

how much that is? Who does?! And yet in a nation where 47 million of us now are having to subsist on food stamps, that's how much Americans spent on their family, their friends and themselves. In just one weekend. "God bless America" indeed!

Somebody I overheard this week quipped, "We ought to be celebrating these numbers—after all, sales like these keep Americans working." Oh really? Do you seriously suppose that American shopping binges are the boon to an economy that is hopelessly in debt. In fact, I wonder how much of this \$59.1 billion was purchased by plastic, boosting the already bulging bankrolls of credit card corporations. Keeping Americans employed? Get serious. Keeping Americans in debt may be the most transparent analysis.

So how does the follower of Christ relate to obscene spending like the weekend past, and to the impoverished Americans who live all around us in this county? "Listen—I pay my taxes—there are entitlement programs to care for the needy—and besides, whose business is it how much money I decide to spent on Christmas!" Sounds like a third millennial Ebenezer Scrooge to me: "Are there not poor houses for people like these? Then send them there—I will not give one penny more."

Aren't you glad God is no Scrooge? After all, what is the meaning of this season's underlying (but awfully hard to hear above the din of the shoppers) narrative? Ever ponder Emily E. S. Elliott's words in that carol we love to sing? Thou didst leave Thy throne and Thy kingly crown When Thou camest to earth for me; But in Bethlehem's home was there found no room For Thy holy nativity.

Not just "a king" and "a crown"-the story of Christmas is the midnightsplitting pronouncement that The King and The Crown of a billion billion galaxies stripped Himself of throne and glory, and descended to this "dark, dirty" race to save us. And I remind you, we were hardly "on sale"—it was not a good buy-which is why no other buyer stepped forward. Which is also why Christmas and Calvary are forever now inseparable. For in the light that shines from the Face in the cradle, from the Face on the cross, we behold in undimmed splendor "the glory of self-sacrificing love" (Desire of Ages 19).

Self-sacrificing love. Black Friday healed by Good Friday. It's how your heart and mind can yet be healed this Christmas, this very day, right now. As the carol ends, "O come to my heart, Lord Jesus, there is room in my heart for Thee."

"From heaven high to earth I come" is how this extensive hymn's text starts. Through 15 stanzas it touches many aspects of Jesus' incarnation. For example, it underscores stark contrasts: "These are the tokens you shall mark: / The swaddling clothes and manger dark; / There you shall find the Infant laid / By whom the heavens and earth were made." And again, "For velvets soft and silken stuff / You have but hay and straw so rough, / Whereon You, King, so rich and great, / As [if it were] Your heaven, are throned in state." Today's opening organ music couples the historic melody of this hymn (in the lowest part) with the joyous seasonal melody IN DULCI JUBILO (in an upper part), the whole flavored with a joyously leaping third part.





WE MOURN



THE NEW HOUSE OF PRAYER In the Commons (downstairs)




