GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN—FOR THE WORLD?

It's not like we haven't been here before. Those who can remember back to 1995 recall that the government was shut down in November that year by our perennial two-party squabble. The reason I remember is because I happened to be in Honolulu for a prayer conference, when the morning news announced that the U.S. government had entered a financial stoppage of sorts. But the world didn't end.

A major difference this time for this nation, and for the world beyond this nation, is that this government shut-down is days away from a major debt-ceiling debate in the same Congress that is now stalemated. If the two parties continue their refusal to compromise and the U.S. debt ceiling is not raised, the Treasury will theoretically be without funds

GOODBYE

When Abraham left Ur and then Haran knowing he would never return (Gen. 11:31), what goodbyes did he have with the relatives he left behind? When Joseph was sold into slavery, his goodbye was pleading with his brothers for mercy. When you are with your family, what traditions of goodbye occur? When we talk to our friends or family on the telephone, how is the conversation ended; is it "goodbye"?

As a child I went to my grandparents' farm to work on Sundays. At the close of the day we would hold hands in a circle thanking God for His watch care over us. As we got in the car to leave, everyone was kissing and saying "goodbye," but then the car doors would shut with the dreaded goodbye sound. I would cry, certain my grandparents would not live until the next weekend. How foolish I was for they were in their 50s and lived into their 90s. However, the concept of 'goodbye' was difficult for me and the sound of the car doors shutting just emphasized the separation.

When I married, my husband and I would visit my parents for a weekend and then leave them on Sunday saying "goodbye." This was always a trauma for me. Even when telephoning my parents, I used to close the conversation by saying "goodbye." But not so anymore; and I have noticed my dad, who is 90, does not either. I say, 'I love you dad,' he follows with, 'I love you.' Why has this changed? Is it because we both know time is short? Is this our last

telephone conversation, but not our last conversation? Is it because we know we shall be together in heaven soon, because Jesus is coming and there will be no more goodbyes?

Why then do we say 'Amen' when we finish our prayers? Is our conversation with our Father ended? Shouldn't we be in continual prayer with our Father (Acts 6:4)? The question to ask is, What does continual conversation with a personal heavenly Father mean? How about, "I'll talk with you again in a few minutes"? *-Anonymous*

GAP / HARVEST SEASON BLESSINGS

Local commercial growers, Andrews Farm, plus local gardeners have abundantly blessed student families with thousands of pounds of produce every week this harvest season. Donations include tomatoes, string beans, watermelon, peaches, pears, apples, grapes, plus much miscellaneous vegetables and herbs.

Fortunately a local business family has for years donated and maintains the cargo van used by GAP volunteers. This van plus a borrowed trailer is used to pick up and deliver ten- and twenty-bushel wooden boxes filled with produce to our GAP distribution center. Every Tuesday and Thursday an average of 120 student families are blessed with this fresh food.

Your cash donations are used by GAP to pay for food staples, such as rice, beans, pasta, canned goods, crackers, dried fruit, nuts, cornmeal, oatmeal, wheat bran, baking flour, salt, etc. Food supplied by GAP is intended to supplement students' food budgets; however, for many students food from GAP makes the needed difference.

JAIL MINISTRY / GOD IS SO GREAT!

I have been visiting inmates in the Berrien County Jail for approximately nine years as a volunteer chaplain. During this entire time I have only had a layperson's ID. With this ID, I had limited access to the inmates due to the rotation of floors every Sabbath.

This has made it difficult to have a constant Bible study every week. I knew that with a Clergy's ID things could be much better. Having wanted this kind of ID since last year, and being a pastor, I applied for a Clergy's ID. Months went by and nothing happened, until one Sabbath this last June, brother Broderick Morris came to me as I was walking down the hall of the jail and said, "Rudy, I am going to get you the blue ID, the Clergy ID, because you come every Sabbath and you are very committed to this ministry."

So I thanked him and prayed about it. By early July I had my new picture taken and the process for obtaining the ID began. The next few Sabbaths I was out of town and did not know what progress was being made with my Clergy ID. I was anxious about it, but on July 27, the first Sabbath back

at the jail, I got my ID and thanked God for answering my prayers. I then prayed that God would give me a Bible study.

As I walked into a cell block where I did not know anybody, there was a man who came up to me and we began talking about the Bible. At the end of our meeting, before we prayed, I asked him if we could continue to study the Bible with some printed lessons the next week. I also asked if we could meet in another room instead of the cell block. Before we parted, he confessed to me that the Sabbath before, he had prayed that God would send someone to him because he wanted to study the Bible.

Isn't God so great?

Since then we have already had eight studies; he never missed one, and both of us are receiving a blessing from them.

This man is just one example of the Bible studies that I give at the jail. Please pray for us and for the jail ministry.

(perhaps by October 17), forcing the U.S. government to begin defaulting on its ever-due debt payments to nations that have purchased portions of our national debt (China, Japan, et al). It all sounds terribly complicated, and the easiest way to deal with it is to simply dismiss it all as the game of political “chicken” or brinkmanship—but the truth is that the global economy is so jittery and unstable now that a major default from the world’s largest economy could eventually result in seismic economic tremors the world over. And what would happen next is the stuff of doomsayers.

The mission of this Fourth Watch blog is to keep a prayerful watch on the unfolding events of this nation and planet. Why? Because the quotation my blogger friend Herb Douglas cites at the end of every blog (“Red Alert”) is strikingly pertinent: “Those who place themselves under God’s control, to be led and guided by Him, will catch the steady trend of events ordained by Him to take place” (*Review and Herald* 8-5-1902).

Which simply means that for those of us who seek to heed Jesus’ admonition—**“When you see these things happening, you know that the kingdom of God is near” (Luke 21:31)**—keeping a watchful, prayerful eye on local, national and global developments is the better part of prudence. How can an apocalyptic movement like this one afford to do anything else?

But watching and praying are not enough. The compelling national and ecclesiastical needs of Japan

(where I just spent two weeks), as well as the “steady trend” of unraveling developments in this nation, are a clarion call for the church to act. How? The political process hardly needs the church to dictate a solution to the government. The towering need of society here and abroad is, as Jesus prayed to the Father on the eve of His own death, **“That they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent” (John 17:3).**

For that reason we’ve invited my friend David Asscherick to spend a few days on campus (October 18-26), seeking to connect with those who do not know God. Because if knowing Him is life’s greatest purpose, then helping others come to know Him is life’s greatest mission and greatest joy. So won’t you please help us help Him by extending an invitation to those who need Him now? Too much is at stake.

MUSIC ALIVE

SHINING & SCHÖNSTER

A word that shines through its various translations is “schönster” in the German language. Translate it “most lovely” or “beautiful” or “fairest” and this adjective variously illuminates its object. In the instance of certain hymn titles, it modifies “Herr Jesu,” which is “Lord Jesus” or “Savior” in translation. Many Americans know the melody of “Fairest Lord Jesus” with the words “Beautiful Savior.” This melody

was sung by country folk in Silesia and “collected” in the summer of 1836. It is, in fact, the thought “Beautiful Savior” that begins stanza four of hymn number 240. It’s a stanza that provides noble lines of poetry for contemplation, along with the Andrews Academy Bell Choir’s rendition—while the bells add their reflecting luster to the radiance of the hymn’s thoughts.

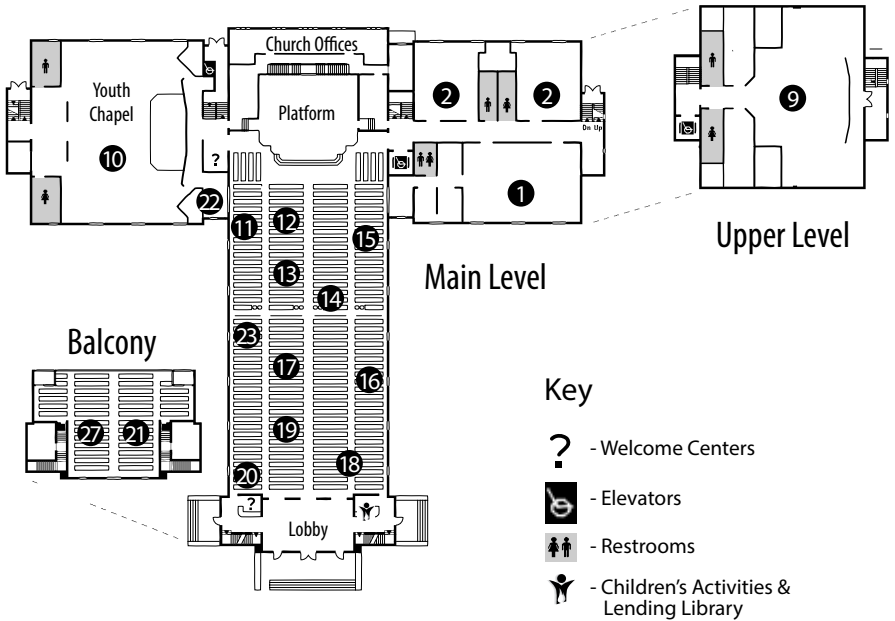

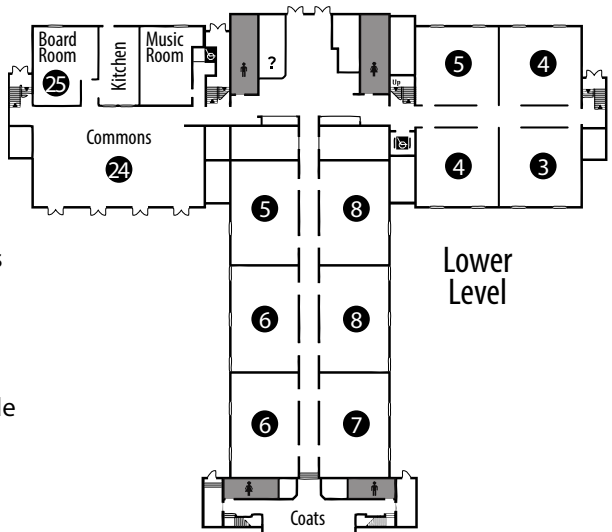

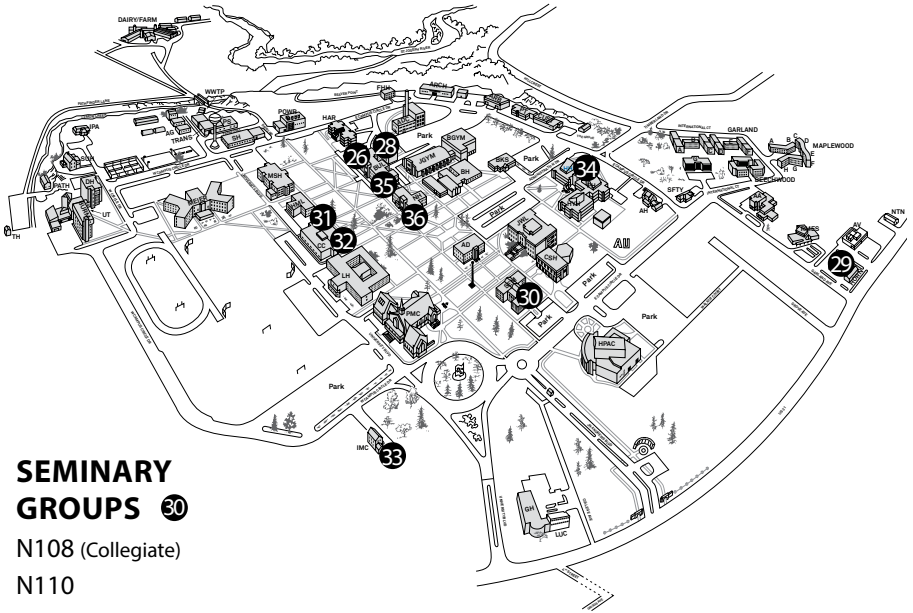
