LESSONS FROM DAD

My father is an amazing person and today is his birthday. In typical dad fashion, my father has dropped subtle (or not so subtle) life hints over the years and I can't help but realize now how significantly his words have shaped my understanding of the Christian journey. To share my testimony of how God has used my father as His lighthouse, here are some of the lessons I've increasingly learnt to lend credence to.

THINK THINGS THROUGH

Decisions are not to be made carelessly and words are not to be tossed out meaninglessly, he taught me. Like most of the teenage population, I'm still not incredibly practiced at filtering foolish thoughts or at judging foolish ideas. I've found myself in more than a few pickles because my eyes couldn't see past the immediate cause and effect, and life has shown me that consequences often run deep. As it turns out, our human tendency to be unthinking and uncaringly selfish can really get in the way of being true Christian witnesses. Our role as ambassadors of Christ should cause us to be always cognizant of the significance our daily choices have upon our own salvation and upon others' salvation. As Solomon said, "Discretion will preserve you; understanding will keep you" (Proverbs 2:11, *NKJV*).

PEOPLE MATTER

Be a good friend to everyone, he taught me. Unfortunately, like the rest of this

planet's inhabitants, I still have a hard time being humble. Pride has caused many a man to lose a friend and there are few who can say they have not once been guilty of letting pride get in the way of friendships. I've come to realize perhaps the reason humility is so integral to human relationships is because we need some knocking down in order to build each other up. God created mankind with a strong sense of fellowship; something that transforms us into a collective unit that is more than merely the sum of its parts. Establishing good relationships with people thus not only affirms God's intentions for united humankind but also affirms His wish for our personal development: "As iron sharpens iron, so a man sharpens the countenance of his friend" (Proverbs 27:17, *NKJV*).

LIVE FULLY

Live life like you mean it, he taught me. A life's full potential can only be unlocked by sincerity and earnestness, and yet, I struggle daily against laziness and indolence. As it turns out, passion cannot be the main driver of our lives. Life simply can't be made up solely of the things we love doing. Even the mundane, the dull, the gloomy parts of our lives should be lived fully. If every evening and morning God grants us is a gift, is it not imperative that every moment of our lives be accounted for? If we truly value the tenuous gift of life, shouldn't it be a priority to ensure each moment adds value to the whole of our existence? Indeed, Solomon reminds



us "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with your might; for there is no work or device or knowledge or wisdom in the grave where you are going" (Ecclesiastes 9:10, NKJV).

KNOW YOUR FOUNDATIONS

No matter where you end up in life, don't forget where you came from and how you got here, he taught me. It's too easy to leave behind the lessons and values of childhood when you've finally "got it made," too easy to forget those very lessons and values were integral to your success. Likewise, clinging to those lessons and values when it seems as if nothing is going right seems to be at least equally difficult, if not exponentially more taxing. In prosperity and in poverty alike, I've found that "He loves me" is the only thing I can undoubtedly lean on. Keeping God's promises at the forefront of our expectations not only makes sense of the dark times but also keeps us from

letting the good times run away with our heads. Keeping true to the foundations of our faith enables us to weather all things, as Paul declares: "For this reason I also suffer these things; nevertheless I am not ashamed, for I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep what I have committed to Him until that Day" (2 Timothy 1:12, NKJV).

These are simple truths with many variants, sometimes gilded with fancy words, sometimes stinging with chastisement, sometimes wreathed by deep sentiments. No matter how *your* father imparts to you his world-tried wisdom, don't forget to thank God for the privilege of loving and learning with Him! ■

A few of us remember reading or hearing recorded mission stories told by Eric B. Hare, a pioneer in the Adventist work among the Karen people of Burma. This year Karen Adventists in North America are celebrating the 100th anniversary of the arrival of Eric B. Hare as a missionary to Burma. This celebration will take place at Andrews University, July 24-26. Three generations of Hares will be present. 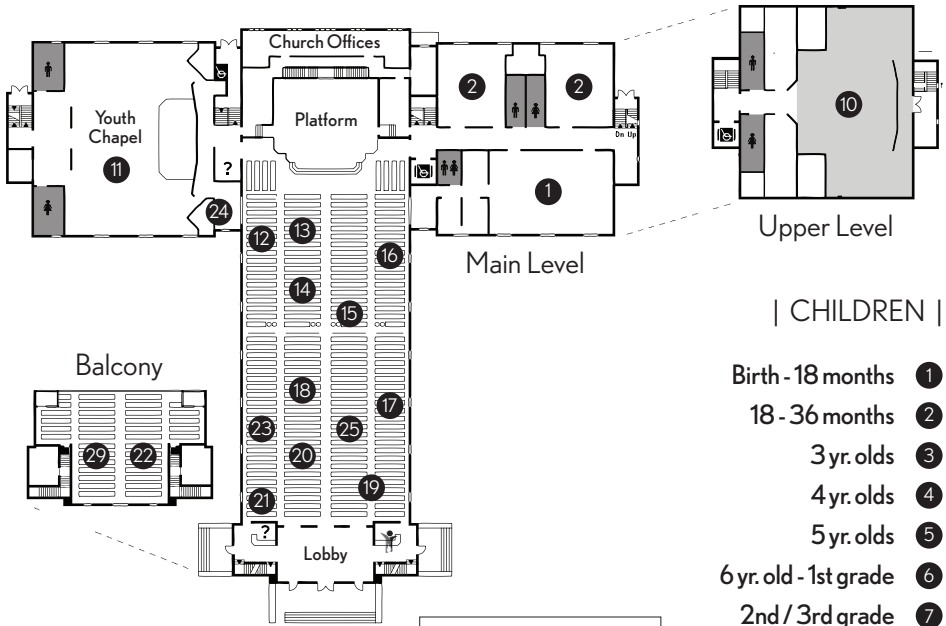

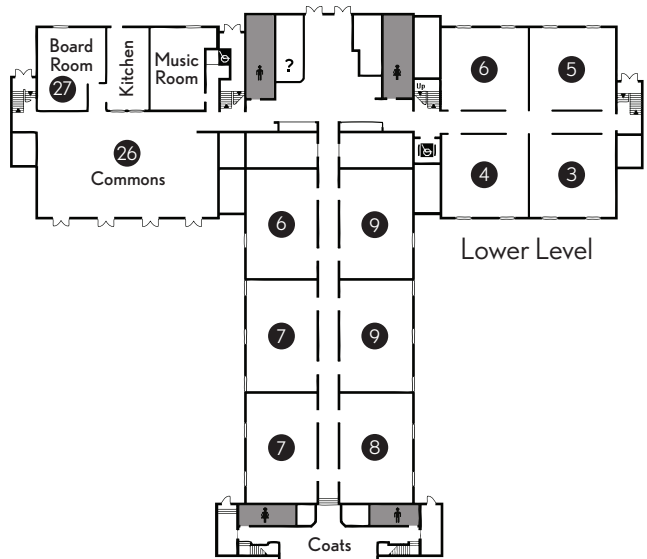

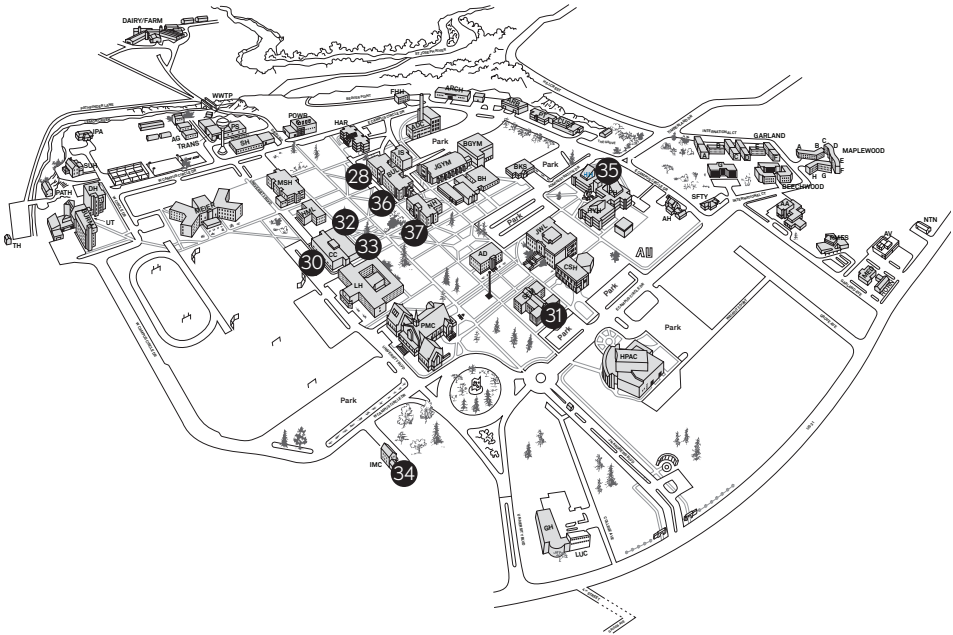
